# FROM THE RABBI'S DESK





#### To eat rice or not to eat rice – that is the question Kitniyot – a fascinating Passover Dilemma

ntil this year, the position of our Conservative Movement on kitniyot has followed the longstanding

Ashkenazi custom of refraining from eating them on Passover. These foods include: beans, corn, millet, peas, rice, soy, and some other plant based foods like mustard, buckwheat and sesame seeds. The one exception was an approved permission of peanuts and peanut oil.

But this past fall the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards passed two responsa which permit the consumption of kitniyot for Ashkenazim. (Our Sefardic friends and family - including our Persian members have always been eating these products on Passover.)

What is going on here? A little background is in order. The prohibition to eat kitniyot - did not appear in Judaism until the 13<sup>th</sup> century. In fact it seems to fly in the face of a specific Talmudic decision (Pesachim 114b). The original reason for this prohibition is not clear and over time rabbis have speculated no less then 12 different reasons for why we should not eat these items on Passover. This has led some authorities to call it a "mistaken custom" and even a "foolish custom". The explanation that I was raised with is that these items could be ground into a flour-like substance (corn flour, rice flour etc) that looks like hametz - and therefore was forbidden as a safety feature to distance us from the hametz itself.

This custom has led to a considerable amount of confusion in Israel where there are large numbers of Sefardim who do eat these subtances – and on the shelves of the supermarket you find labels that identify products as kosher for Passover and kosher for Passover for Sefardim only!

So if this custom is relatively a late addition in Judaism and has no good rationale for its maintenance - why should we not all begin including these items in our Passover diet? Well there remains one compelling reason for not eating kitniyot on Passover: minhag avoteynu b'yadeynu - we are strongly attached to the way we were raised and the customs we grew up with.

To be honest – that is where I find myself – no good reason to persist in this custom other than I have not done so for so long – it is hard to change!

In short if you are someone who is uncomfortable with change and slow to embrace new things - by all means there is no reason you have to begin eating kitniyot on Passover. If however you are a vegetarian, someone who is concerned that many of the things included in kitniyot like soy, etc are critical to a healthier diet - you may want to consider this

If you are considering this change here are some important considerations that are included in the paper:

1) Fresh corn on the cob and fresh beans (like lima beans in their pods) may be purchased before and during Pesah, that is, treated like any other fresh vegetable. 2) Dried kitniyot (legumes, rice and corn) can be purchased bagged or in boxes and then sifted or sorted before Pesah. These should ideally not be purchased in bulk from bins because of the concern that the bin might previously have been used for hametz, and a few grains of hametz might be mixed in. In any case, one should inspect these before Pesah and discard any pieces of hametz. If one did not inspect the rice or dried beans before Pesah, one should remove pieces of hametz found in the package on Pesah, discarding those, and the kitniyot themselves remain permissible. 3) Kitniyot in cans may only be purchased with Pesah certification since the canning process has certain related hametz concerns, and may be purchased on Pesah. 4) Frozen raw kitniyot (corn, edamame (soy beans), etc.): One may purchase bags of frozen non-hekhshered kitniyot before Pesah provided that one can either absolutely determine that no shared equipment was used or one is careful to inspect the contents before Pesah and discard any pieces of (hametz). Even if one did not inspect the vegetables before Pesah, if one can remove pieces of (hametz) found in the package on Pesah, the vegetables themselves are permissible. 5) Processed foods, including tofu, although containing no listed hametz, continue to require Pesah certification due to the possibility of admixtures of hametz during production. 6) Even those who continue to observe the Ashkenazic custom of eschewing kitniyot during Pesah may eat from Pesah dishes, utensils and cooking vessels that have come into contact with kitniyot and may consume kitniyot derivatives like oil.

Even for those of us who are continuing with the practice of not eating kitniyot would be well advised to consider loosening some of the stringencies that were placed on top of this stringency-and feel free to use oil from legumes and all the other foods that were added to the list of forbidden foods over the years, such as peas, garlic, mustard, sunflower seeds, peanuts etc.

As many of you know – I have preached for years that the purpose of Passover is to have a joyous celebration of our liberation and not to trade our slavery in Egypt to a slavery to onerous and unnecessary Passover restrictions.

Many will embrace this new understanding as a way to increase Passover joy. If it makes your life easier and adds joy and pleasure to your observance of Passover - it is now kosher for Passover in Conservative Judaism!

## CANTOR'S NOTES



'a Nishtana Halayla Haze??? Why is this Passover going to be different for me than all other Passovers? I'll tell you

why... You see, when it comes to my immediate family. many of you aren't aware that with the exception of my wife and two children, I am alone in the USA. In 1977 when my parents brought me with them to this country at the age of 11, my other siblings stayed behind in Israel. My two older sisters were already married and my brother was 18 and serving in the Israeli army. They never moved out of Israel and eventually my parents moved back long after I got married to my darling and loving wife Marsha, who is a born-and-bred American. So here I am, missing my family very much, especially at holiday times. What is even more difficult is missing a myriad of important family events such as birthdays, anniversaries, and other get-togethers where family members share what has been happening in their lives while I am unfortunately left out. Thankfully in today's world I can rely on technologies such as Facebook and Wattsap to keep a constant line of communication open but there are occasions when those are just too impersonal to be adequate. There are times when getting together means just that and no technology can replace a warm hug or a kiss from a loved one, especially when they have been missed due to distance.

This year, I miss one more family member - my daughter Jessica, who is spending a year in Israel on the Nativ program studying a semester at Hebrew University and serving the Israeli community in the town of Yerucham. She has been there since last September and while we are happy that she is having an amazing time, we have missed her terribly. So you can imagine my glee when I found out that the members of the Board of TBS agreed to grant Marsha, Perry and I the opportunity to travel to Israel this year to spend Passover at my mother's home and to celebrate the Seder with my entire family, including Jessica. This is something that most of you are able to take for granted as your families are around the corner or a short car ride away but for me has been a life-long dream that is about to come true. Not only is it the distance that kept us apart all these years but also my occupation. My father was a cantor until his retirement at 70 and having been engaged as a cantor from the age of 16 myself, leaving our respective temple communities during the Passover holiday was almost unthinkable. So, for the past 30 years I have ended up celebrating Jewish holidays without my parents or siblings. Every year at the end of the Seder we all sing the familiar prayer "Next year in Jerusalem" and I can tell you that for me this prayer is very personal because I always longed for this moment to come when I will have the opportunity not only to celebrate Passover in Jerusalem but the Seder with my family. While I am saddened that my father who passed away 15 years ago will not be able to enjoy this reunion, I still know that it is truly going to be an occasion to thank God and recite the Shechevanu praver for sustaining my family and I so that we can spend this Passover together around one table.

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# FROM THE DESK OF RABBI KERBEL

#### Passover: Asking the Right Questions

he Nobel prize-winning physicist, Isidore Rabi, once explained how he became a scientist. When

he would come home from school, his mother did not ask him, "what did you learn today?" but, rather, "Izzy, did you ask a good question today?"

To be a Jew, is to ask questions. Our rabbinic tradition was based on asking questions about a word or verse in the Torah, or debating an aspect of law with pointed question-

ing. To be a Jew really means that we are a religion that encourages us to struggle with our beliefs, to act on our passions, and to strive to understand our relationship with God and our tradition.

Where does this passion for questions come from? Ultimately, it may come from our celebration and observance of Passover. In the Book of Exodus, the Torah describes a number of situations where children may come and ask us (the parents) to explain Jewish ritual and customs to them. Based on these verses, the Haggadah presents to us "the four questions" and "the four children." The central focus of the Passover Seder is to explain our traditions and history by encouraging our children to participate by asking questions.

The "Four Questions" is one of the most special moments of our seder. For some of us, our children or grandchildren are reciting them for the first time. In other homes, there may not be any young children and

teenage or college students are often embarrassed that they still have to recite the questions. But a number of scholars have pointed out that we have been misinterpreting the idea behind the four questions. It is not the mastery of these questions that is so important. These questions were meant to be **examples** of the types of questions we can ask at the seder. In fact, the Mishna, our first code of Jewish law (c. 200) states that if children are too young to ask (spontaneous ) questions, it is the father who teaches (questions like) "the four questions" which are not really formulated as questions but as 'statements of wonder' encouraging the children to ask even more questions. The Talmud indicates that those at the seder can ask **any** question that stimulates discussion and allows us to act as free people.

So this year, I would like to assign to all of us a 'homework assignment.' I would like to encourage you to take some time to prepare carefully 'the spiritual side' of your seder. What will you include and what will you leave out? Where can you linger for a few extra moments with questions and commentary? And I would especially like you to prepare in advance four additional questions that you would like to ask or to discuss after we recite the traditional 'four questions.' The haggadot of the secular, non-religious kibbutzim of the 1930's in pre-state Palestine give us some

examples: "Why do people all over the world hate the Jews?" "When will there be peace and brotherhood the world over?" Let's go around the table. Let's linger a bit. Let's ask new questions: questions about Passover, questions about the Exodus, guestions about the Torah or Jewish tradition, questions about Jewish survival and Jewish continuity, questions about tikkun olam and the lessons we learn from the Passover experience. Like Isidore Rabi, let us ask, "Did I ask a good question today?" Questioning is truly a sign of freedom and crucial to re-enacting the Passover experience.



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


## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK





#### **MEN'S CLUB CORNER**





#### **MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS REWARDS**

hen you think of a membership benefit, you will rarely, if ever, think about the cemetery. But one of the lesser known benefits of membership at Temple Beth Sholom is exactly that. Temple Beth Sholom, as a service to its members, makes available plots at New Montefiore Cemetery, in an area reserved for Temple Beth Sholom. These plots are available at very reasonable prices. We recently surveyed Beth Moses Cemetery, Wellwood Cemetery and New Montefiore Cemetery. All of these cemeteries are located in Pinelawn, NY, less than a 30 minute drive from the Temple. We determined that the Temple is providing a significant discount, to its members, on the prices for plots in the Temple area. This discount is approximately 33% to 50% lower than the prices that the cemeteries currently sell plots for.

The Temple can provide members with either single or double plots, or family plots of four or more graves. The family plots have a single family monument that has the family name, and individual footstones for each interment. Each single plot can have an individual headstone, and each double plot can have either two single headstones or a double headstone, at the family's option. If you have any interest in purchasing plots in the Temple Beth Sholom area of New Montefiore Cemetery, please contact the Temple office.

In addition, Temple Beth Sholom in conjunction with New Montefiore Cemetery, now allows grave plantings. When an interment is made on our cemetery grounds and the family wishes to arrange for a planting, they will be allowed to plant Mature Yews (consisting of 3 shrubs 18"- 24" wide) purchased from the cemetery. Families that wish to have grave plantings will be required to purchase "Perpetual Care" from the cemetery. These shrubs do wonders in improving


the look of the gravesite. Grave plantings will also be allowed at the Temple Beth Sholom area of Beth Moses Cemetery. All families that have already had an interment at either cemetery and desire grave plantings should contact the cemetery to make the appropriate arrangements.

The Jewish way of life includes many Jewish life cycle events. During a typical Shabbat service at Temple Beth Sholom you can witness any of several of our Jewish life cycle events. You can witness the naming of a baby girl and her welcoming into the Jewish community; you can witness a bar or bat mitzvah, where our Jewish adolescents are transformed, right before our eyes, into Jewish adults; or you can witness an aufruf, where two of our Jewish adults prepare for life as a married couple.

Just as there is a Jewish way of life, there is also a Jewish way of death. Two basic considerations come into play when death strikes and the laws of death and mourning become applicable. One consideration involves the principle of *kevod hamet*, treatment of the deceased with reverence and respect. The other involves the principle of *kevod hechai*, concern for the welfare of the living. In respect for members of our congregation who have suffered a loss, Temple Beth Sholom allows the family to hold funeral services at the Temple.

Yes, membership has its rewards, and although we hope you will never need these membership benefits, it's nice to know that they are available to you if you do need them.

#### From the Archives...

In commemoration of the 65th Anniversary of TBS, the following is a timeline of highlights in the history of TBS from 1947-1970.

1970-2016 will be included in the next bulletin.

#### 1940's

 Roslyn Jewish Community Center established and later split into Temple Sinai (Reform) and Liberal Conservative

#### 1960's

#### 1950's

- June, 1951- "You are cordially invited to attend a Charter Convocation for the founding of a Liberal Conservative Jewish Center for the Roslyn area..." was the invitation extended by 30 plus families
- August 3, 1951- Temple Beth Sholom held inaugural services
- September, 1951- 14 acres on a hill overlooking Roslyn Road purchased for \$30,000, High Holiday Services held in Odd Fellows Hall and Roslyn Theater
- 1951- Max Greenfield first president, Rabbi Jacob Hochman interim first Rabbi, Sylvia Jalonack first Sisterhood president, Religious School established
- 1952-1953- First building (unfinished and bare) dedicated summer 1952, Synagogue planned, Annual fundraising and programs initiated: Kol Nidre Appeal, Journal Dinner Dance, Raffles, Bazaar, Shows, Lecture Forums, etc.
- 1954-1955- Auditorium/Synagogue dedicated January 10, 1954, "First come, first served" High Holiday seating established, Cantor Morton Kula arrived
- 1955-1956- First wedding at TBS: Cantor Morton and Charlotte Kula, December 25. 1955, 25th anniversary of Rabbi Hyams' ordination celebrated June 10, 1956, Youth Director hired, Library opened, Construction started
- 1957- \$600,000 building fund campaign initiated for new school wing, offices, garden/atrium and Sanctuary designed by renowned synagogue architect,Percival Goodman. Victory Ball, ground breaking held, Construction started
- 1958-1960- Organist Frank Ferago hired, New School and Activities Building dedicated September 18-20, 1959, Nursery School established September, 1960

- celebrated Journal theme, Let's Get It Done in '61. Israel's Bar Mitzvah celebrated at Fifth Annual Music Festival, Religious School accredited by United Synagogue Board of Education, Sanctuary, Youth Lounge and School Building dedicated, Dr. Benjamin Schwadran became Religious School Principal, Nursery School registered by NYS; playground constructed, Saul Shulman hired as first Executive Director Dr. Mordecai Kaplan inaugurated new Forum Series, December 12, 1962
- 1963-1964- North Shore Hebrew High School organized and housed at TBS, Over 100 TBS youngsters escorted on two-day trip to Washington, D.C., TBS Bar Mitzvah celebrated – Annual Music Festival: Judas Maccabeus, with "Interfaith Chorus of Long Island", led by Cantor Kula
  - 1965-1966- Cantor Kula and Temple Choir sang at President Johnson's birthday party, Construction of new synagogue entrance driveway, Long Range Planning Committee formed, Junior Congregation introduced, First annual "Hands Across the Sea" – foreign students welcomed
- 1967-1968- 24- hour Eternal Light Vigil on behalf of Soviet Jewry, Temple Beth Sholom Credo adopted by membership, VAC (voluntary additional contribution) Dues program adopted, Rabbi Herbert Amster became first Ritual Director Adult Education enrolled 225 members, Kinnus hosted 100 young visitors from Montreal, Meetings held to discuss exclusive caterer
  - 1969-1970- Judaica Museum established, Farewell dinner held for Rabbi Ario and Tess Hyams, Rabbi Joseph and Gerri Sternstein welcomed during Hanukkah Service, Solomon Schechter School moved to Temple Beth Sholom, Yitzhak Rabin spoke at Solomon Schechter Dinner

#### The Grapes on the Vine...

ur theme for this year is "...Mi'pri yadehah nata karem"- "...with the work of her hands she plants a vineyard." What grows in the vineyard? Grapes. What do Jews do with grapes? We make wine. While wine is an important part of every Shabbat and Yom Tov for Kiddush, it is an essential part of Pesach, when we drink four cups of wine during the course of the Seder.

For Sisterhood women and our families, the *Sedarim* are the culmination of weeks of preparation. The house needs to be cleaned and the *hametz* removed. New foods need to be



bought, and often year-round cabinets are emptied so we have space for the *Pesach* dishes and foods. Since it is *Chag Ha-Aviv*, the Springtime Holiday, it is often a time to shop for new Spring clothes. Whether you cook all the food yourself or order it in, the menu requires time and effort to plan.

While many of us might wish to go to sleep one night and wake up the next morning with all of these tasks accomplished, let us think back to our theme of planting the vineyard. It is the time, effort and care that is spent planting and nurturing the vineyard that makes the grapes that grow so special. The process endows the final product with significance. So it is with our preparations for *Pesach*. As we busy ourselves with the cleaning, planning, shopping, cooking and baking, we build up to the culmination of our efforts- the *Pesach Sedarim*- the ultimate family meal and celebration. 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
