FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Living Once - Dying Twice



Living once and dying twice?! That seems like an absurd idea. We only live once and we only die once, or at least such is the common experience of the human race. Not so, claims the Psalmist of Old: "*Nish-kati Ke-met Mi-lev*", "I am forgotten like a dead man, out of mind and out of heart." (Psalm 31:13) What I believe the psalmist is teaching is that if after a loved one dies and is buried in the ground – if the survivors then

put their loved one out of mind and out of their heart, then such a deceased person is condemned to die a second time. He or she literally dies twice. The first death is the one that our bodies suffer – the second is when we are forgotten, when no one cares enough to remember us.

Despite all of the great advances in medical science, we have not yet eliminated death from our human experience. It is not within our power to prevent those we love from dying. But it is entirely within our power to determine whether our deceased shall die a second, unnecessary death.

There are a number of ways that we Jews go about preventing such a tragedy. The best is to conduct our lives in such a way as to emulate the values and concerns that were of importance to our loved ones when they were alive. We then become a living memorial. When we name children after a loved one who has died, we also perpetuate their presence in our lives. We conduct a wonderful program as part of our student's preparation for their Bar and Bat Mitzvah where we give parents an opportunity to explain why they chose the names they did for their children and speak a bit about the loved one for whom they were named.

Another way to memorialize a loved one is through a Memorial Plaque in our sanctuary. Anyone who has been in our Main Sanctuary has noticed the Memorial Plaques along the back wall. Many families have found this to be a meaningful way to keep the memory of loved ones alive. These plaques become a *zecher olom*, an everlasting memorial to their departed. You can contact the Temple office for more information on how to arrange for a Memorial Plaque.

Judaism also helps us remember through a brilliant system of laws and rituals. *Shiva*, *Kaddish*, *Yahrtzeit* (*Solgarde*) and *Yizkor* – are all wonderful aids in helping us remember the life and love of a close one.

I am often puzzled and pained when I see children who do not observe these basic customs. Too often a *Yahrtzeit* goes unnoticed or a *Yizkor* time is forgotten. And in doing so, our loved ones recede out of mind and out of memory. Every morning and every evening at Minyan we pause before the *Kaddish* is recited to read the names of the *Yartzeits* for that day, and too often no one is present to fulfill the act of remembrance through *Kaddish*. But for those who are there, it is a powerful and meaningful moment.

The time has come for a strengthening of these values and these customs. When you receive a *Yahrtzeit* notice, please make the effort to attend synagogue and say *Kaddish* – on the *Yahrtzeit* day. Come and keep your loved one's memory alive.

People frequently ask me why it is necessary to come to shul to remember a loved one. "If I stand in my kitchen and offer a silent prayer – is that not just as good as coming for *Minyan*?"

The truth is that good intentions are not sufficient. Unless you ground those good intentions in a discipline and regimen more likely than not what began as a beautiful gesture of remembrance will end as another in a long line of personal commitments and resolutions that are forgotten.

Judaism offers you a wonderful opportunity to maintain the bond of love and friendship with those who have died through *Kaddish*, through prayer in the context of a supportive and loving faith community. Death ends life, but it does not end a relationship. Join us at *Minyan* to honor your loved one and perpetuate their memory in your life.

As you know, Marsha and I rode together 165 miles on bicycles throughout the south of Israel as part of the annual five-day Israel Ride, sponsored by Hazon and the Arava Institute. Both organizations do sacred work in promoting health, harmony and green energy. They provide a space for incredible young adults of all faiths to put their minds to work and come up with solutions to some of

the most vexing challenges facing Israel and the world today.

Our journey began in Jerusalem and took us through a number of towns, finally ending up in Eilat. The scenery we rode through was breath-taking and the cherry on top was doing it all with our dear members Louis Naviasky and his sweet friend Ivan, Rebecca and Morty Schaja and Lisa Blaustein. The Samuel's from Shelter rock Jewish Center joined our group as well and we all had great fun whizzing up and down the rolling hills of the Negev, sometimes riding on major roads assisted by the police and sometimes riding through pastoral *kibbutzim* where the smell of cow manure almost knocked us off our bikes...lol.

This annual ride is, of course, a significant fundraiser for these two institutions. The amount of work and effort that goes into planning and executing it is mind-boggling. The details include coordinating with the various police, army and security forces to keep us all safe, to making sure that all 160 riders have a room to sleep in every night. When our buses finally dropped us off at our hotels or hostels every evening, our keys were waiting for us and our luggage was already in our rooms. Every detail was taken care of and this is all because they appreciate the efforts we made in raising the money they need to continue their work in improving the environment in Israel, both agriculturally and politically. The Arava Institute purposely offers an environment of equality and tolerance for Arabs, Christians and Jews to learn from each other and work together on solutions because they all understand

that Israel is a small country, even including Gaza, and a clean environment doesn't differentiate between people of different faiths. It affects everyone the same way and they are ALL responsible for its health.

Therefore, Marsha and I would like to take this opportunity for allowing us to complete this amazing mission. Joining the ride meant that we committed to a significant threshold of funds raised and we couldn't have reached our goal without each and every one of you that donated generously in our honor. We truly appreciate it and please know that your funds are being used for amazing purposes that embrace the ideals of love and unity in a land that desperately needs it.

Please enjoy these few photos from our ride. We hope that next time we attempt it, many more of you will join us.

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI URI ALLEN

Lulei Torat'cha sha'ashu'ay, az avad'ti b'on'yi



Lulei Torat'cha sha'ashu'ay, az avad'ti b'on'yi

If the Torah had not been my delight, I would have perished in my affliction.

-Psalm 119:92

If there is one verse that sums up my professional experience of being a rabbi and teacher of Torah, this might be it.

I love Torah so much! For me it is a combination of the intellectual stimulation that Torah study gives me combined with the opportunity to translate that learning into meaningful action that motivates me. Not to mention the opportunity to bring that excitement to others (like you!).

Yet I find the Psalmist to be reflecting a view that need not be held exclusively by those of us who toil in Torah professionally. The poet is describing his experience with Torah as one of delight and enjoyment, as opposed to a burden and heavy load. That is not to say that living a life of Torah does not come with some challenges. But even within the rules and regulations, the proscribed behaviors and restrictions, what is being described is an aspirational view that declares in unequivocal terms that Torah is fun, playful and life affirming.

This is exactly the feeling that I get on Shabbat following our morning Torah study. For those that do not yet know or have not attended, each Shabbat morning we begin our prayer experience with *shaharit* (the morning service) in the chapel at 9 am, followed by 20 minutes or so of looking at the weekly Torah portion, before joining the rest of the congregation in the Sanctuary. Though it is a relatively short amount of time, these moments of study give us the opportunity to engage our Holy texts

adding contour, meaning and joy to our Jewish lives. It is hard to describe the feeling in the room. There is energy, a buzz, an excitement that comes from having our hearts and souls lit up by Torah study. We react and interact with the text just as much as with each other. We grapple with our weekly Torah reading and the opportunity it presents us to ask "Where am I in this story"?

I bring all of this to the surface for a few reasons. The first is to make sure that everyone knows that this opportunity exists at TBS. But perhaps more importantly

I share the excitement and impact of this change to celebrate and publicize how successful we have been in just a few short months after launch. The response has been very gratifying and overwhelmingly positive. Additionally it has been instructive about what you are looking for in your Shabbat experience at TBS. We are a diverse congregation with diverse interests and needs in terms of Shabbat.

Hopefully we have created some frameworks to broaden the possibility for engagement on Shabbat.

If you have not done so yet, I hope you will join us in the coming weeks and months to try it out for yourselves. Together, through our engagement with Torah and our Tradition, we can bring the words of the Psalmist to life and truly delight in Torah.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

As many of you know, this past year TBS amended its Constitution and one of the changes was to establish the VP of Administration. I consider myself lucky and fortunate to be the first person to serve in this position. While I have no one's example to follow, I view this as an opportunity to make the position everything I believe it should be.

The stated purpose of the position is to address all matters related to the administration of the Temple. I expect that many of the matters I will work on will be of the mundane, everyday variety, but I am excited for the opportunity to address those matters that will help move the Temple into the next phase of our existence.

By way of example some of the matters I have already been involved with include: security arrangements; the physical plant of the Temple; and legal matters related to the Temple. I look forward to working closely with the Executive Director, the President and Executive Vice President, Chairs of various committees, the Clergy and the Temple staff to address issues that not only impact us on a day-to-day basis, but over the long term as well.

SECURITY RELATED ISSUES

The Temple is in the final stages of retaining an outside security company to develop and provide security procedures to be implemented for the ECC and Religious schools to address potential events and circumstances that might arise. Once these procedures are finalized, the outside security company will assist the Temple in implementing the procedures and will provide training sessions for administrative and school staff.

FINE ARTS COLLECTION

As we are all aware, TBS possesses a magnificent and extensive collection of fine art. An important aspect of safeguarding our Fine Arts collection is making sure that it is properly insured. As part of that process we need to periodically have the collection appraised to make sure that proper insurance coverage is in place. We are beginning the process of updating the inventory of the collection and will undertake having the collection appraised.

GRANTS

We are continuing our efforts to apply for grants and funding from both governmental and private programs to update and safeguard the Temple facility. These applications involve a great deal of time and effort by our dedicated Temple staff. We have been fortunate enough to have received several of these grants

over the past number of years and intend to continue our efforts to secure this type of funding in the future.

These are but just a few examples of the matters that I have been addressing in the early days as the VP of Administration. It is my hope that I will be able to handle these and similar matters so that it frees up time for the President, Executive Vice President, Clergy and staff, allowing them to focus on moving us, as a congregation, forward into the upcoming decade.



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Kita Zayin (7th grade) Visits the Atria in Roslyn Harbor



We are very proud to have started a program this year between our Zayin, 7th grade, students and the seniors at the Atria in Roslyn Harbor. We have been fortunate to obtain the *Better Together Grant* through Legacy Heritage Programming. This grant allows us, over a three year period, to bring our Zayin students to the Atria to have engagement between our youth and seniors in the community.

Once a month, for 8 months, the Zayin students and seniors meet and have engagement components to their get togethers where they share conversation, refreshments and form friendships and bonds through special activities. Our goal is to have each group learn from each other.

We have had three wonderful gatherings so far this year on Sundays – October 27th, November 24th and December 8th.

Our first session was a *Getting to Know You Meet and Greet*. We had a short introduction to the program and played an icebreaker game, shared brunch and had a formal picture and videotaping of all the participants. Each student was paired with a senior and they guided and instructed the seniors on how to use various means of technology such as iPads and phones.

During our second session we explored the Jewish culture of doing *mitzvot* (good deeds). We braided and baked challah (the traditional Shabbat bread) together, creating partnerships in community. They were able to choose different toppings to adorn their challahs. Seniors shared their wonderful memories of cooking and baking for the holidays with the students. Students taught the seniors how to look up recipes on cooking and baking websites on ipads. We incorporated the theme of *Hachnasat Orchim* (welcoming guests), a worthy lesson for young and old.

For our third session they started off sharing conversations and refreshments. Students taught the seniors how to use different apps and shared their preferences in music as they explored the sites. They enjoyed a holiday snack of potato latkes with apple sauce and sour cream, Israeli jelly donuts (*sufganiyot*), chocolate Chanukah gelt (coins) and holiday cookies. Rabbi Allen, our Associate Rabbi, was there and we played *Name That Tune* as Rabbi Allen played traditional holiday songs on his guitar for

the seniors while the students played Spotify to listen and guess their songs.

This program is evolving into something much bigger than we anticipated and dreamed about. Our students can't wait to arrive at the Atria and they quickly go over to their senior to see how they have been doing. This is what community engagement/friendship is all about.

Thank you to our teachers – Hanna, Susan, Silvia and to Megan at the Atria for all the planning and hard work it takes to bring these groups together once a month. We look forward to continuing these sessions over the next few years to bridge the gap between the generations.

Membership has its Rewards

When you think of a membership benefit, you will rarely, if ever, think about the cemetery. But one of the lesser known benefits of membership at Temple Beth Sholom is exactly that. Temple Beth Sholom, as a service to its members, makes available plots at New Montefiore Cemetery, in an area reserved for Temple Beth Sholom. These plots are available at very reasonable prices. We recently surveyed Beth Moses Cemetery, Wellwood Cemetery and New Montefiore Cemetery. All of these cemeteries are located in Pinelawn, NY, less than a 30 minute drive from the Temple. We determined that the Temple is providing a significant discount, to its members, on the prices for plots in the Temple area. **This discount is approximately 33% to 50% lower than the prices that the cemeteries currently sell plots for.**

The Temple can provide members with either single or double plots, or family plots of four or more graves. The family plots have a single family monument that has the family name and individual footstones for each interment. Each single plot can have an individual headstone and each double plot can have either two single headstones or a double headstone, at the family's option. If you have any interest in purchasing plots in the Temple Beth Sholom area of New Montefiore Cemetery, please contact the Temple office.

In addition, Temple Beth Sholom in conjunction with New Montefiore Cemetery, now allows grave plantings. When an interment is made on our cemetery grounds and the family wishes to arrange for a planting, they will be allowed to plant mature yews (consisting of 3 shrubs 18"- 24" wide) purchased from the cemetery. Families that wish to have grave plantings will be required to purchase "Perpetual Care" from the cemetery. These shrubs do wonders in improving the look of the gravesite. Grave plantings will also be allowed at the

Temple Beth Sholom area of Beth Moses Cemetery. All families that have already had an interment at either cemetery and desire grave plantings should contact the cemetery to make the appropriate arrangements.

The Jewish way of life includes many Jewish life cycle events. During a typical Shabbat service at Temple Beth Sholom you can witness any of several of our Jewish life cycle events. You can witness the naming of a baby girl and her welcoming into the Jewish community; you can witness a *bar or bat mitzvah*, where our Jewish adolescents are transformed, right before our eyes, into Jewish adults; or you can witness an *aufruf*, where two of our Jewish adults prepare for life as a married couple.

Just as there is a Jewish way of life, there is also a Jewish way of death. Two basic considerations come into play when death strikes and the laws of death and mourning become applicable. One consideration involves the principle of *kevod hamet*, treatment of the deceased with reverence and respect. The other involves the principle of *kevod hechai*, concern for the welfare of the living. In respect for members of our congregation who have suffered a loss, Temple Beth Sholom allows the family to hold funeral services at the Temple.

Yes, membership has its rewards, and although we hope you will never need these membership benefits, it's nice to know that they are available to you if you do need them.


