FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The High Holy Days - A Time of Continuing Renewal

One of my favorite prayers is the one that contains the phrase: "*Hamechadesh B'tuvo b'chol yom tamid maaseh breishit*", which translates: "God in His goodness continually renews each day the work of creation." I like that phrase because it captures such a basic Jewish attitude.

For us, creation is not something that took place a million or a billion years ago, with one big bang that once and for all set matter in motion. As Jews, creation begins each new day – we open our eyes in the morning and the gift of a new world awaits us. Each day, every hour, every moment is a new beginning.

It is a wonderfully optimistic perspective. It implies that no matter how deep the rut we are in, no matter how bad the mistake we have made, or how severe our troubles have become, we hold within our hands the ability at all times to begin again.

So, it is appropriate, at this time of year, as we look forward to the High Holy Days, as we begin again, that we remind ourselves of this inherent ability to renew ourselves and our lives. This is the time of Rosh Hashanah, of the beginning of a new year; this is the time when kids go back to school and begin a new year; this is the time in the synagogue when we finish the cycle of the reading of the Torah and on Simchat Torah begin all over again; this is the time of *Shabbat Bereishit* when we read, "In the Beginning..." and remind ourselves of the constant sense of renewal that is always within our grasp.

It has been a tough year. Mass shootings, terror attacks around the world and here at home, a presidential campaign that is wearing on all of us, the anti-Semitism in Europe and on our college campuses, we could use a new beginning, a fresh start. This year, more than many, we welcome the arrival of Rosh Hashanah with its concept of renewal. If ever there was a need for us to believe in our ability to begin again - this is the year.

I look forward to coming to shul this Rosh Hashanah and in the presence of a community of friends, taking a very deep breath and closing the chapter on a very difficult year and embracing the possibility of beginning again - of welcoming a new year with all of its possibilities and hope.

I look forward to *Tashlich* this year. *Tashlich* is a wonderful tradition of going to a source of natural running water (we go to the Roslyn Duck Pond) for a very brief recital of prayers and a tradition of casting breadcrumbs into the

water. It symbolizes our casting off of what was and beginning anew with a fresh start. We will hold our Tashlich Service of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Monday, October 3 at 5:30 PM. If you have been there you know what a special celebration it is - if not, consider joining us this year.

And then comes Sukkot - I invite you to take a new look at a very old holiday. Come join us in the celebration of Sukkot. Sukkot sometimes gets lost in the shadow of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. But anyone who has experienced the joy and beauty of these special days knows that Sukkot is one of the happiest and most joyous of all the Jewish holidays. If you have not yet discovered this secret - consider joining us in our celebration of Sukkot- we have a wonderful new Sukkah you must see!! All the details are listed in this bulletin. We need more opportunities for celebration in our life and Sukkot is a wonderful excuse to celebrate.

Yes, "*Hamechadesh B'tuvo b'chol yom tamid maaseh breishit*." God is continually blessing us with the opportunity to start again. And this Rosh Hashanah it is a blessing we need more than ever. Join me in embracing a new year with all of its hope for renewal and rebirth.

“High Holidays” vs “Days of Awe”

Much can be learned about people from their response to the question of whether they think Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the “High Holidays” or the “Days of Awe” because these are two very different descriptions of the same days. The “High Holidays” are the days when we are literally on a high and are filled with excitement because we know that we’ll see family members and friends that we may not have seen for a year. We all know that at most temples around the world, there are those who duck in and out only during the High Holidays, the so-called Three-Days-a-Year Jews. If that is largely your involvement in and expression of Judaism that is ok, but by definition it means that you are not that interested in the observance of the daily and weekly rituals of your tradition. You have a peripheral association with your faith and therefore it is a safe assumption that when you do come to temple during those three days, you are probably more interested in the social aspects of this experience rather than the ritual. Of course, I may be generalizing here but I think you will find that there is some truth to that. On the other hand, there are those who cultivate a much more serious and invested relationship with their Judaism by being a part of its ritual calendar all year long and almost by definition, for them these are the “Days of Awe”. They come to temple with a sense that they are literally being judged by God for their behavior and therefore treating these holidays only as social events is almost a sin. I’m not saying that one should not have a good time at temple, I’m just suggesting that we should all strive to use our time at temple – even if it’s only for these three days – as a serious time for reflection on the year that has passed and how we can make our lives more meaningful in the year that is beginning.

In Hebrew, these days are called “Yamim Noraim” – The awe-filled days. One can joke of course that these days, with their long-winded prayers and strange rituals can indeed be “aweful” but that would be missing the point. The Hebrew is obvious in its intent for these holidays. I don’t know of any Hebrew term that is used to describe these days as “High Holidays”, only as days which are filled with

awe. What is awe? Awe is a sense of fear of something that is bigger than you that controls you and commands you to do good deeds while demanding constant improvement from you. It is that fear that drives you to sit for hours upon hours at temple contemplating your life and its meaning and how you can become a better person, a more contributing person, a more loving and compassionate person.

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI KERBEL

Rosh Hashanah: Grand Opening or Going Out of Business?

A story is told of a new immigrant who wanted to fulfill the American Dream and open his own grocery and dry goods store. He wasn't quite sure how to get started, so he walked the streets of New York to get some ideas. He noticed a store with a lot of customers and he inquired what was going on. A member of the owner's family told this new immigrant that the store was crowded because it was their "Grand Opening." Obviously, lots of people flock to a new store to see what they have and if this is a store they will like.

A few blocks away, he noticed another busy store. This one had a different sign though. It said it was 'going out of business.' We have all experienced the great sales to be had in stores going out of business and I am sure we have also seen stores that have been around for years with a 'going out of business' sign at their entrance.

The immigrant thought he had figured it all out, so when he opened his new store, he had two signs. One said "Grand Opening". The other proclaimed, "Going Out of Business." Needless to say, he didn't have many customers because they decided, this guy has to be a 'meshuganer' – a 'lunatic!'

It's a cute story, but let's not move on too quickly from the lesson it teaches us. Rosh Hashanah is "Hayom Harat Olam" - "The birthday of the world." We gather in our congregation on Rosh Hashanah for many reasons, one of which is because we know that it is the beginning of a new year. We are able to clean the slate from last year and begin the year afresh and make a new start. We have so many plans. We make so many promises (to ourselves and to others – maybe even to God!).

How soon after Rosh Hashanah do we forget our plans, our goals and our promises? Our behavior, when it comes to our congregation and homes – the plans to attend services more often, to celebrate Shabbat – more often – to attend a minyan or a class or become involved in our Jewish community – how quickly does the promise of a 'Grand Opening' look more like a 'going out of business.' The excitement and enthusiasm of the New Year often disappears before we celebrate Simchat Torah or Thanksgiving.

So this year, let us try to prolong the beauty of the beginning of a New Year. Let us seek to repair a relationship in need of attention, or focus on our charitable giving which

Thankfully, our Kehila is blessed with many who, like the prophet, stand up and say, "Here I am, send me." Throughout any given year many issues arise in our temple community. What are some of those issues? Membership recruitment and retention for our temple and schools, making TBS a more inclusive community, building repairs, marketing and communicating, programming, tikkun olam, support of Israel, and more. Then there is that part of reality that demands us to enhance and increase our donor base, without which we couldn't accomplish anything.

In our mission to better understand the political scene in Israel and its relationship with the US, thanks to the encouragement of Rabbi Lucas, Rabbi Kerbel, Lillian Litvak and Cindy Feldman, TBS had over 40 representatives go to the AIPAC convention in DC last spring. In order to increase awareness of life in Israel and contact with young Israelis, TBS for the last two years has been part of the Shin Shin program, where we bring Israeli students to our community at large during their gap year between High School and the army. These young leaders work in our Hebrew School and youth programs. Thanks to the generosity of our Hebrew School families, Sharon Solomon, Sisterhood, Men's Club and clergy, this meaningful connection takes place. In 2017, TBS will once again host a KINNUS for our youngsters. Thank you to Lewis Bartell, Michael Hirsch and Edward Ward for stepping up and chairing this event. (By the way, this *aint* no small task)

Thank you to Sandy Berger, who not only stands up and offers help involving religious affairs matters but if something needs architectural know how at TBS, Sandy is always there. We are fortunate, thanks to the generosity of our Joshua Society donors, (please see their names on

the poster board outside the office) to be able to redesign and repair the steps of the Roslyn Road entrance to the temple. Sandy kept our vision of inclusivity in mind, thus, a ramp, for easier handicapped accessibility was included in the plans. All will be ready for the New Year. According to UJA findings, it is estimated that up to 20% of Jews have some type of disability, including developmental, emotional, cognitive and /or physical. TBS has been sensitive

to many of these issues but we are aware that we still have a lot to do. Our inclusion committee, membership committee and staff are working on building awareness; the community has to see that there are barriers, physical ones, verbal ones and printed ones that have to be brought down so all will feel welcome. Please contact me if you have a concern or can add expertise in furthering this initiative.

As far as building repairs go, a special shout out has to be included here to the Ostrow, Rubinstein & Auerbach families whose commitment to the beautification and repair of our synagogue has been so magnanimous for so many years.

Our clergy, staff and leadership are always doing a self-evaluation; we try to be as objective as possible.

We ask each other, and ourselves what looks good, what needs improvement? Like the prophet, Isaiah, we are human and therefore bound to make mistakes. However, we hope that angels hover over us as well, in whatever form we see them and lead us to feel willing and able to say, "Here I am, send me."

Committed, involved, caring about Jews and the world at large, in a world where violence and fear is stifling inclusivity, to say the least, we are fortunate to have a community who strives to take hold of torah and works at living by its principles.

With the onset of the High Holidays, I, like many of you, take stock of that of which I am thankful. Amongst my blessings of family, friends, living in a free country, I feel very blessed to be part of this kehila kedosha. Temple Beth Sholom, my kehila, where so many stand up and say, "Here I am, send me". Let's all continue to lead by this example.



MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS REWARDS

When you think of a membership benefit, you will rarely, if ever, think about the cemetery. But one of the lesser known benefits of membership at Temple Beth Sholom is exactly that. Temple Beth Sholom, as a service to its members, makes available plots at New Montefiore Cemetery, in an area reserved for Temple Beth Sholom. These plots are available at very reasonable prices. We recently surveyed Beth Moses Cemetery, Wellwood Cemetery and New Montefiore Cemetery. All of these cemeteries are located in Pinelawn, NY, less than a 30 minute drive from the Temple. We determined that the Temple is providing a significant discount, to its members, on the prices for plots in the Temple area. **This discount is approximately 33% to 50% lower than the prices that the cemeteries currently sell plots for.**

The Temple can provide members with either single or double plots, or family plots of four or more graves. The family plots have a single family monument that has the family name, and individual footstones for each interment. Each single plot can have an individual headstone, and each double plot can have either two single headstones or a double headstone, at the family's option. If you have any interest in purchasing plots in the Temple Beth Sholom area of New Montefiore Cemetery, please contact the Temple office.

In addition, Temple Beth Sholom in conjunction with New Montefiore Cemetery, now allows grave plantings. When an interment is made on our cemetery grounds and the family wishes to arrange for a planting, they will be allowed to plant Mature Yews (consisting of 3 shrubs 18"- 24" wide) purchased from the cemetery. Families that wish to have grave plantings will be required to purchase "Perpetual Care" from the cemetery. These shrubs do wonders in improving

the look of the gravesite. Grave plantings will also be allowed at the Temple Beth Sholom area of Beth Moses Cemetery. All families that have already had an interment at either cemetery and desire grave plantings should contact the cemetery to make the appropriate arrangements.

The Jewish way of life includes many Jewish life cycle events. During a typical Shabbat service at Temple Beth Sholom you can witness any of several of our Jewish life cycle events. You can witness the naming of a baby girl and her welcoming into the Jewish community; you can witness a *bar or bat mitzvah*, where our Jewish adolescents are transformed, right before our eyes, into Jewish adults; or you can witness an *aufruf*, where two of our Jewish adults prepare for life as a married couple.

Just as there is a Jewish way of life, there is also a Jewish way of death. Two basic considerations come into play when death strikes and the laws of death and mourning become applicable. One consideration involves the principle of *kevod hamet*, treatment of the deceased with reverence and respect. The other involves the principle of *kevod hechai*, concern for the welfare of the living. In respect for members of our congregation who have suffered a loss, Temple Beth Sholom allows the family to hold funeral services at the Temple.

Yes, membership has its rewards, and although we hope you will never need these membership benefits, it's nice to know that they are available to you if you do need them.


