FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Making good on those High Holy Day Promises. A trip to Israel this year!

So now the holidays are over and we are all returning to our daily routine - now comes the hard part - of taking all those positive commitments that we were so determined to keep and making them part of our daily life. I have already seen some of you giving it your best. Those families that said to me "Rabbi we are really going to start coming to shul more often..." I see that they are really making an effort to make good on their good intentions. And to those of you who commented after my invitation to go to Israel this year: "You know the rabbi is right, we really should make an effort to go to Israel this year!" We have a wonderful TBS trip that will be departing on February 13 and returning on the 24th.

What a wonderful trip it is going to be. We will visit Tzfat in the north and the Dead Sea and the Negev in the South. We will be in Jerusalem of course and Tel Aviv! And for those of you who have participated on one of our previous trips you know that what makes it a memorable experience is not only that we will see all the sights, stay at the finest hotels and eat at wonderful restaurants and have a wonderful time doing so, but there is one additional element that makes these trips unique. We understand that visiting Israel is unlike any other trip you will take in your lifetime. It is a spiritual journey that changes the way we look at ourselves and our world.

As Rabbi Lawrence Hoffman says in his wonderful book: *Israel- A Spiritual Travel Guide* – we all carry around in our heads, our own map of the world. Some of you may remember the famous Saul Steinberg cover to the New Yorker Magazine which tried to capture the map of the world that New Yorkers seemed to carry around in their heads. This was updated in a recent cover of the New Republic Magazine when playing on the Saul Steinberg cover they pictured the map that many Americans seem to be carrying around in their heads today that imagines Israel as occupying a central place in the world (as opposed to the tiny country it actually is). When we travel to Israel we will pack a map of the topography and topology of the Land of Israel. It will show that Jerusalem is approximately an hour's drive from Tel Aviv and Tzfat to Jerusalem can be traversed in a few hours. But, we will be carrying another

map as well, a spiritual map – this one will remind us that we are on a sacred pilgrimage – it will help us understand that we are walking the same path that Abraham walked and like Abraham we come as pilgrim and not as tourist.

What is the difference between a pilgrim and a tourist? As Rabbi Hoffman puts it: "Tourism is the ultimate experience in nothingness, as tourists, we leave to 'get away from it all.' We 'do nothing,' even 'vegetate,' or 'recharge our batteries,' for a successful return to work... Tourists go to Jerusalem the same way they go to Disney World: not to pray at the Western Wall but to take pictures of other people praying there... As pilgrims we are pulled by the still small voice of conscience that sends us to Israel because it is time to head home... Tourists capture sights in living color. Pilgrims are themselves captured by the site's holiness. "

Many wonderful members of our congregation will be traveling with me and Sharon Solomon to Israel in February. Many of you will begin as tourists, but at some point the land of Israel will have its own way upon us and we will be transformed into pilgrims. For those who know the feeling that transformation can bestow, I know how

you might envy our journey, but there is still time to consider joining us – there is always room for a few more!


The show will be in our ballroom and will include a light dinner at your table, so **reserve your seats now!!!**

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI URI ALLEN

Modeh ani lefanecha... I am grateful to you...

I am filled with so much gratitude and still flying high from my first High Holy Days here at Temple Beth Sholom! Thank you for making it so wonderful for me and Sari and our children. Yes, it is a lot of work to prepare between writing sermons, mapping and planning the services, meetings, cooking, cleaning, and then of course the physical, mental, and emotional output of the days themselves. It can be enervating, but even as I write this just two days after Yom Kippur, I am carrying the energy and spirit of all who contributed to those days with me into Shabbat and Sukkot.

It can be a strange experience being a new comer to a community and especially when one is tasked with facilitating and leading people in worship, contemplation, and the hard work of returning to our best selves. I learned a lot about myself as a rabbi to be sure. But I think that I learned even more about Temple Beth Sholom and why it is such a special community.

I would like to share some of my observations and insights with you.

1. This shul knows how to pray! Throughout my own Jewish journey I have been blessed to have davened with many different communities. Some were typical Conservative synagogues, others were independent minyanim (one of which I founded and another which I led with a team of volunteers). One was a neo-hasidic-renewal community and some were Reform. What strikes me about the *tfilah* life in this shul is how warm it is. That is in no small part due to Cantor Barnoy. You can tell that when he is leading us in prayer that he is not just singing, but he is showing us a model of what prayer with *kavannah* – intention – can look like. That energy radiates out to the pews and is metabolized by the congregation to phenomenal and vital results. The quiet moments of prayer are filled with contemplative energy and the high points of song flow with harmony and heart. For a person who might be a *tfilah* snob of sorts (that's me), I love davening here. It is a real pleasure.

2. You care about this synagogue and this community. It's hard to count the number of instances I have seen individuals and groups give of themselves for the benefit of the community. And though we have a tremendous lay leadership group, they are not the only ones from whom I have seen this type of caring and generosity. Just about each time I have made a hospital visit, there have been other congregants coming before or after me. You have pitched in around the office during this time of staff transition. You have been there at funerals and shiva minyanim. You have answered our calls to attend the daily minyan. You have given Sari, our children and I so much support as we get settled. It's an embarrassment

of riches. These acts are the truest measure of a community and we've got it in spades!

3. We have phenomenal professionals and staff! Most of you don't get to see the day-to-day life of work here in the TBS office. From Rabbi Lucas and Donna Bartolomeo, to Cantor Barnoy and Sharon Solomon, Bob, Barbara, Kathy and all of our administrative and maintenance staff, we have a wildly talented team. And it truly is a team. The back and forth over key decisions, the planning and thinking, and then the executing is happening not only at a high level but with equally high degrees of collegiality, respect, passion, and know-how. It is humbling, in the best sense of the word, to be a part of such a team.

4. You are serious about your Judaism. For most of my short rabbinic career, I would not get many questions of a *halakhic* nature. Since being here that number has been eclipsed by quite a lot. You not only want to be doing things 'the right way' (whatever that means) but more importantly in my observations, you want your Judaism to be more than academics and texts (though there is a high level of interest in that here too). Rather, I have seen you take messages from the bimah and integrate them into your real lived lives. There is no greater Joy for a rabbi than knowing that their messages are received, welcomed, and put to good use.

5. You are committed to the Jewish People. Hey, did you see that article about Israel in the paper? Did you hear what is going on at that college campus or another? What do you think about this or that topic of national Jewish interest? These are all beginnings of conversations I have had with you these past months. You are connected to what is going on. You read Jewish newspapers and follow Israeli news and current events. You are devoted supporters of Israel and Jews around the world as well as here in Roslyn. You manifest a deep teaching that though we might not always like all Jews, they are nonetheless our family, and you love them.

I have been inspired by all of this in such a short time. As our post-holiday routine comes upon us, I hope you will remember that this community really is all of those things and so much more. We are fortunate indeed and I can't wait to see what the future has in store for TBS!

Since last High Holidays, about 30 new families representing about 100 members have joined or rejoined our TBS community. Our Religious School enrollment is booming- we have over 30 students in our kindergarten class. Our ECC toddler program is filled to capacity. As we continue to welcome new members, we need to ensure that they have a building to come to, clergy to worship with and programs to share with us.

As we moved on to Sukkot, many congregants got to enjoy the holiday in our beautiful Sukkah. Thank you to the Religious School PTA for decorating the Sukkah. RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

As many of you know, creating true and lasting connections between our students and Israel is one of the chief goals of Temple Beth Sholom's Religious School. While secondary sources such as books and videos remain vital teaching tools for introducing and educating children about the Jewish homeland, here at Temple Beth Sholom, we understand that there is simply no substitute for the gift of tangible, human interaction and relationships.

Over the years, Temple Beth Sholom's Religious School has fostered strong partnerships with Jewish organizations such as JNF (Jewish National Fund), UJA (United Jewish Federation), Jerusalem U and the Israel Center of the Sid Jacobson Community Center in order to provide our students with every opportunity to experience the culture and wonders of Israel. This means not only integrating hands-on activities such as Hebrew food, music and dance into our weekly curriculum, but providing experiences to meet, hang out with and learn from actual Israelis.

Over the past four years, Temple Beth Sholom has participated in the **Shinshin Program**, which brings an Israeli gap-year student (someone who is between high school and IDF services) to our religious school. This year, we are privileged to have Omri Hollander from Givatayim, Tel Aviv spending the year with us at TBS. Omri is a bright and engaging high school graduate who has volunteered to do an additional year of service by coming to visit. We are thrilled to have Omri with us, and for our students to meet him.

What we have learned since the inception of our Shinshin Program is that in fostering close relationships with Israeli teens, our students gain a genuine understanding, appreciation and sense of responsibility for safeguarding the State of Israel. To put it simply, they become *invested*. Through first-hand conversations and activities, the children come to realize how similar Israeli and American kids can be – enjoying the same music, TV shows and hobbies – but also what an awesome responsibility it is for 18-year old Israelis to join the IDF in order to serve and protect Israel. Through conversations with shinshin, students learn about the Israeli draft process, and how Israeli teenagers both apply and prepare for various positions within the army. Only after the successful completion of their IDF service (three years for men, two for women) do Israelis begin their college education.

Time and again, Shinshin has proven to be a wonderful, meaningful, eye-opening program. Students learn first-hand from young, motivated Israelis what it means to volunteer and be a part of something greater than themselves. Through this program, every student at Temple Beth Sholom's Religious School is given the opportunity to have a bit of Israel brought to them. It is with deep and sincere appreciation that we thank Rabbi Lucas, the Board of Education and the numerous parent donors who support this program year after year.

Finally, for those of you who feel like a "taste of Israel" just isn't enough, Temple Beth Sholom is fortunate to be leading a **Family Trip to Israel** led by Rabbi Lucas and myself. This trip will take place **February 13th -24th, 2019**. If you're looking to have the trip of a lifetime, and to experience Israel in a unique and educational way, I encourage you to join us on this wonderful adventure!

The Cub Scouts- Sea Change* (*a profound or notable transformation)

It's here! The long awaited inclusion of girls into Cub Scouts starts this month and TBS has this area's only Cub Pack for girls. Presently, each "Den" is comprised of children from a single elementary school grade. All Kindergarteners are Lions, all 1st graders are Tigers, 2nd graders are Wolves, etc. all the way through 5th grade. Now there will be a Den in each grade for boys and another for girls. Each Den will be single-gender for weekly meetings... and all Dens of each gender will meet together once each month for trips, outings, award ceremonies and parties. It's a great system that preserves the Cub Scouting program that's been so successful for over a century, and creates a welcoming environment for everyone.

This year, trips are planned to a local police precinct, a firehouse, a local courthouse, a local waterworks, a children's museum, an aquarium, and two camp outs with parents. We'll also go swimming, ice skating, and do some simple but meaningful community service to round out the program.

The exciting part of the program is that 5th grade girls will now "bridge over" to the Scout Troop in February of 2019 – just like the

boys. Girls will be able to go through the Scouting program and earn the coveted Eagle Scout medal, Scouting's highest honor. The lesson to be learned here is that boys and girls can be in the exact

same program with the exact same requirements and advance on a completely level playing field. Boys and girls won't simply be taught that they are equal, they will see it and live it. It's an experience that can't be replicated in sports where size and weight may play a role in performance, or in many music or drama groups where some children are chosen for roles or solos and others are not. Each child advances at his or her own pace, but is held to the highest standards. The Roslyn Troop already exceeds the national average on "graduating" Eagle Scouts. It will be a race of sorts to see who is the first girl in America

to reach this prestigious goal. Will she be from Roslyn? From TBS?



Membership has its Rewards

When you think of a membership benefit, you will rarely, if ever, think about the cemetery. But one of the lesser known benefits of membership at Temple Beth Sholom is exactly that. Temple Beth Sholom, as a service to its members, makes available plots at New Montefiore Cemetery, in an area reserved for Temple Beth Sholom. These plots are available at very reasonable prices. We recently surveyed Beth Moses Cemetery, Wellwood Cemetery and New Montefiore Cemetery. All of these cemeteries are located in Pinelawn, NY, less than a 30 minute drive from the Temple. We determined that the Temple is providing a significant discount, to its members, on the prices for plots in the Temple area. **This discount is approximately 33% to 50% lower than the prices that the cemeteries currently sell plots for.**

The Temple can provide members with either single or double plots, or family plots of four or more graves. The family plots have a single family monument that has the family name, and individual footstones for each interment. Each single plot can have an individual headstone, and each double plot can have either two single headstones or a double headstone, at the family's option. If you have any interest in purchasing plots in the Temple Beth Sholom area of New Montefiore Cemetery, please contact the Temple office.

In addition, Temple Beth Sholom in conjunction with New Montefiore Cemetery, now allows grave plantings. When an interment is made on our cemetery grounds and the family wishes to arrange for a planting, they will be allowed to plant Mature Yews (consisting of 3 shrubs 18"-24" wide) purchased from the cemetery. Families that wish to have grave plantings will be required to purchase "Perpetual Care" from the cemetery. These shrubs do wonders in improving the look of the gravesite. Grave plantings will also be allowed at the Temple Beth

Sholom area of Beth Moses Cemetery. All families that have already had an interment at either cemetery and desire grave plantings should contact the cemetery to make the appropriate arrangements.

The Jewish way of life includes many Jewish life cycle events. During a typical Shabbat service at Temple Beth Sholom you can witness any of several of our Jewish life cycle events. You can witness the naming of a baby girl and her welcoming into the Jewish community; you can witness a *bar or bat mitzvah*, where our Jewish adolescents are transformed, right before our eyes, into Jewish adults; or you can witness an *aufruf*, where two of our Jewish adults prepare for life as a married couple.

Just as there is a Jewish way of life, there is also a Jewish way of death. Two basic considerations come into play when death strikes and the laws of death and mourning become applicable. One consideration involves the principle of *kevod hamet*, treatment of the deceased with reverence and respect. The other involves the principle of *kevod hechai*, concern for the welfare of the living. In respect for members of our congregation who have suffered a loss, Temple Beth Sholom allows the family to hold funeral services at the Temple.

Yes, membership has its rewards, and although we hope you will never need these membership benefits, it's nice to know that they are available to you if you do need them.
