FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The Holy Days Are Awfully Late This Year!

I bet you have already had a conversation with someone who remarked, "Wow! The High Holy Days are

LATE this year!"

I remember one famous comedian who used to ask: "How come the High Holy Days are always early or late, but never on time?"

The fact is they are always on time- precisely on time. They never deviate. For thousands of years we Jews have observed Rosh Hashanah on the First day of Tishre without fail. It is merely the relationship of our ancient lunar calendar to the less ancient solar calendar that causes an apparent shift from year to year. Because this past year was a leap year and because a leap year in the Jewish calendar necessitates the addition of an entire month (as opposed to the secular calendar which adds only a single day for a leap year) - the adjustment of the calendar pushes the holidays into October as opposed to September. But don't worry; slowly over the next few years they will creep earlier and earlier - until the next leap year correction.

But, the real question is not whether Rosh Hashanah, or Yom Kippur, or Sukkot, will be here on time but will we be ready on time!

Yes, the process of introspection and the taking of our spiritual inventory should already have begun. As Rosh Hashanah approaches we are called upon to evaluate our lives and change them for the better.

With the luxury of September to prepare for our "late" Holy Days we will be holding a study seminar to help you get ready for the High Holy Days. On Sunday September 18 we will join for breakfast after minyan and then study from 10-11:30. The seminar is titled: "Are you High Holy Day ready?" It will be taught by Rabbi Kerbel, Cantor Barnoy and myself. We will learn about the overall structure of the High Holy Day Services - what are the major themes of these days and how do the Services and customs of this holiday move these themes forward. We will study up close a few of the key prayers and the Cantor will teach us about the nusach - the melodies of these special days

As we strive to prepare for the upcoming High Holy Days, I would like to share with you some suggestions by Rabbi Emanuel Feldman that will help you get the most out of the time you will spend in the synagogue. I have also taken the liberty of adding a few suggestions of my own for the members of Temple Beth Sholom.

The Holy Days present a grand opportunity for returning to our own sources as Jews. The time in the synagogue should not be squandered, but used to great effect. Here are some suggested guidelines:

1) Relax. Don't worry about keeping up with the pages. If you find a prayer whose words reach out to you, dwell on it.

Don't rush.

2) Try not to talk to people around you. Not just for reasons of decorum, but because prayer is essentially a question of mood. Chit-chat destroys the mood.

3) Come early and prepare to stay. A brief visit to shul will leave you cold. A longer stay enables you to get into the spirit of the day (not to mention a better seat).

4) Relax again. Remove any chips from your shoulders, whether against God or man, against Judaism, the Torah, the administration, whatever.

5) Don't take your pulse. Don't worry if you are "enjoying" the services, if you are being inspired, moved, or stimulated. Let the words, the melodies, the mood, your own mind take hold of you. Forget yourself, lose yourself in the davening.

6) Bring your whole self into the davening. Put yourself into it. It is a lot like dancing (take it from an expert) - you have to learn how to let yourself go. Speak to God when you daven. Pour out your heart, God wants to hear from you.

7) Learn how to listen as well. Don't just "read" your prayer book. Listen to it. The prayers were written by religious geniuses. And when you pray, you are really listening to a magnificent religious symphony. Consider leaving your phones at home. The whole idea of High Holy Days Services is to introduce you to a new world, a sacred world - these devices as wonderful as they are tether us to this world in ways that are not helpful as we seek to carve out a moment of sacred communion. In shul you come to communicate with God. Your cell phones are of no use to you here and worse they draw you back into a world of meetings, obligations, and responsibilities - a world of distractions. The sanctuary should be a world of attention and focus. A world where you can find respite from all the things the phone represents.

8) Be patient. The fact that Temple Beth Sholom attracts thousands of people for these Holy Days is a privilege and a challenge. If it gets a little overwhelming remember that all these people have come for the same reason you have. And while some may not be able to give voice to their commitment as clearly as you - we have all come together to sense the kedusha - the sanctity of a special time and place.

9) Be gentle in your judgments of others and their motives - remember God is judging us as well.

10) Praying/Davening together on Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, or Shabbat is such a privilege. Look at it as such. You will be participating, before you know it, in a mystical colloquy of God, man, Israel, and from the Jewish people, past, present, and future.

I am excited to once again have the privilege to share this experience with you and your family on the coming High Holy Days which because they are so "late" this year, gives us plenty of time to prepare!

CANTOR'S NOTES

Reflecting on Jewish Life in Spain

On July 3rd I joined the Cantors Assembly (CA) 10-day mission to Spain. We were about 100 cantors, spouses and congregants, totaling 375 people mostly from the USA and Canada. We traveled throughout Spain and explored our long Jewish heritage there beginning in Barcelona and making our way through Madrid, Toledo, Gerona, Granada and Seville.

This wasn't the first CA mission. Mission 1 was to Poland in 2009. Mission 2 was to Germany in 2012 and the next mission will probably take us to Italy in about four or five years.

The unifying idea is to celebrate the Jewish culture that coursed through these places before the Jews were driven out. In Poland and Germany it also became an opportunity to overcome our anger about what happened to our people there - not to forget, God forbid, but to reach out to those who have been reaching out to us. In Poland, which once was one-quarter Jewish, many people have come to realize that you cannot tell the history of Poland without incorporating the history of its Jewish community. When we were in Warsaw, ground was broken for **the first Polish Museum of the History of the Jews** - not the extermination

of Jews or another Holocaust museum. In Germany, one of the many events we participated in was the consecration of a monument erected by the German government to memorialize the Israeli athletes that were murdered during the Olympic games in Munich. Of course, in both places we visited the concentration camps that our people endured. There is simply no way to travel to Europe in search of your Jewish roots and avoid these places, for the destruction of Judaism that happened in those places is as real as the thousands of years of Jewish life that came before it.

Going to Spain, the heart of what became worldwide Sephardic Jewish tradition, was naturally our next destination even though most cantors are Ashkenazi in lineage. Many of you have probably visited Spain, and if so, you have likely visited the "Jewish" sites of Spain. I put Jewish in quotes because there often isn't much to see or feel there that is Jewish since the Jews left Spain by 1492 and many even earlier than that and it's not the same thing as having left in the 1930s as was the case in Poland and Germany. There, we still felt a very real and disturbing

presence of the magnitude of the utter annihilation that took place. In Spain, it was more subtle and removed.

Jewish life in Spain was once rich and deep-rooted, originating in the 2nd century CE and flourishing for centuries later but it disappeared completely after the expulsion of 1492. After that, there simply isn't much that is Jewish to see in Spain. Yet, those who left Spain took with them a vibrant Jewish and Spanish culture that they nurtured in many of the places they went, a culture that continued to flower in a specifically Sephardic way for centuries and affected normative Jewry shared by both Sephardim and Ashkenazim such as the influence of the works and teachings

of Rambam (Maimonides) and Ramban (Nachmanides) amongst many other great Jewish figures that emerged in Spain. How is it possible that our people were thrown out and were still able to build so much in the other places they went to? That's been our story and our strength time and time again, rebuilding Judaism from the ruins wherever we ended up. It is difficult to imagine a rebirth of Jewish life in Spain, but who knows what opportunities might lie ahead?

Jewish music was a meaningful and deep presence on our trip. Dozens of colleagues were featured in concerts and musical

services, providing a sound track that no other visitors to Spain or "Jewish Spain" have ever had before. From a celebration of Jewish music from around the world on the 4th of July in Barcelona to several evening concerts in formal concert venues and to the Shabbat services held in one of our hotels, those who were in our 10-bus entourage were treated to music in Hebrew, Spanish, Ladino, Yiddish, English and more – music sung by an inspiring cast of men and women from coast to coast and Canada, from the Conservative and Reform cantorate included in our membership.

We went to Spain in search of a trace of a remarkable people and unfortunately we found little evidence of it remaining there. Yet the evidence is with us every day wherever we live. Spanish Jewry is alive and well in us, the next generation. With God's help we will continue to write its story for centuries to come. Amen.

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI KERBEL

Why We Need The High Holy Days

A prominent football player once said of the Super Bowl, "If this is the ultimate contest, how come we are going to play another one next year?"

Similarly we can say of the High Holy Days, if their purpose is to change us and take us in a new, better and different direction, why would we need one every year? Why can't we just do it right and proceed indefinitely in that new direction? If we spend Rosh Hashanah thinking about our lives and our values, our goals and our vision for the future and if we spend Yom Kippur repenting for our sins and emerge feeling cleansed, why do we need to do that every year?

Rabbi Harold Kushner gives a valuable explanation: "The answer is that teshuvah (repentance) is never a one-time event, like getting married; it is an ongoing process, like being married. Yom Kippur is not a spiritual carwash which we enter dirty and from which we emerge clean. Yom Kippur is a periodic reminder of what we need to be doing consistently and constantly, as part of our ongoing effort to become the kind of people we ought to be."

One scholar calls the High Holy Days, "days of moral and cosmic self-evaluation." The hours we spend in our synagogue on the High Holy Days, if we spend them wisely, provide us with quality time to evaluate our lives and our actions. And what makes the High Holy Days special for us is that we observe them *as a community*—each of us is solitary in our self-examination but by sitting with family and friends we feel the comfort and security that being part of an extended family-holy community brings to our 'heshbon hanefesh' our accounting for our actions.

Even the founder of Labor Zionism in Israel, A.D. Gordon, while rejecting the religiosity of his Eastern European background argued: "This is the main thing...the individual can conduct a self-reckoning any day...but what is significant here (referring to Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur) is the power of multiple individuals joining forces...the noble melody that rises above the single voice merged in a sea of voices of the supreme, human-cosmic chorus."

People always ask, when will we blow the shofar this year (signifying that Yom Kippur is over)? It is tempting to say: Yom Kippur is never really over. Yom Kippur ends an hour after the time of candlelighting the day before (or, when it is dark and we can see three stars). But the struggle to change, to fill our lives with holiness and deeds of loving-kindness, hours spent helping those in need and in our quiet moments struggling to resist temptation and actions that take us away from God and from the blessings God gives us – is a constant, never-ending task.

Whatever time Yom Kippur is over, the process of self-reflection, self-examination, repentance and change just begins all over. Just as we look forward to The World Series, The Masters, The US Open and the Super Bowl every year, we must embrace the challenge and the gift of the High Holy Days and use each of the moments in these ten days of repentance thoughtfully and wisely.

MEMBERSHIP HAS ITS REWARDS

When you think of a membership benefit, you will rarely, if ever, think about the cemetery. But one of the lesser known benefits of membership at Temple Beth Sholom is exactly that. Temple Beth Sholom, as a service to its members, makes available plots at New Montefiore Cemetery, in an area reserved for Temple Beth Sholom. These plots are available at very reasonable prices. We recently surveyed Beth Moses Cemetery, Wellwood Cemetery and New Montefiore Cemetery. All of these cemeteries are located in Pinelawn, NY, less than a 30 minute drive from the Temple. We determined that the Temple is providing a significant discount, to its members, on the prices for plots in the Temple area. **This discount is approximately 33% to 50% lower than the prices that the cemeteries currently sell plots for.**

The Temple can provide members with either single or double plots, or family plots of four or more graves. The family plots have a single family monument that has the family name, and individual footstones for each interment. Each single plot can have an individual headstone, and each double plot can have either two single headstones or a double headstone, at the family's option. If you have any interest in purchasing plots in the Temple Beth Sholom area of New Montefiore Cemetery, please contact the Temple office.

In addition, Temple Beth Sholom in conjunction with New Montefiore Cemetery, now allows grave plantings. When an interment is made on our cemetery grounds and the family wishes to arrange for a planting, they will be allowed to plant Mature Yews (consisting of 3 shrubs 18"- 24" wide) purchased from the cemetery. Families that wish to have grave plantings will be required to purchase "Perpetual Care" from the cemetery. These shrubs do wonders in improving

the look of the gravesite. Grave plantings will also be allowed at the Temple Beth Sholom area of Beth Moses Cemetery. All families that have already had an interment at either cemetery and desire grave plantings should contact the cemetery to make the appropriate arrangements.

The Jewish way of life includes many Jewish life cycle events. During a typical Shabbat service at Temple Beth Sholom you can witness any of several of our Jewish life cycle events. You can witness the naming of a baby girl and her welcoming into the Jewish community; you can witness a *bar or bat mitzvah*, where our Jewish adolescents are transformed, right before our eyes, into Jewish adults; or you can witness an *aufruf*, where two of our Jewish adults prepare for life as a married couple.

Just as there is a Jewish way of life, there is also a Jewish way of death. Two basic considerations come into play when death strikes and the laws of death and mourning become applicable. One consideration involves the principle of *kevod hamet*, treatment of the deceased with reverence and respect. The other involves the principle of *kevod hechai*, concern for the welfare of the living. In respect for members of our congregation who have suffered a loss, Temple Beth Sholom allows the family to hold funeral services at the Temple.

Yes, membership has its rewards, and although we hope you will never need these membership benefits, it's nice to know that they are available to you if you do need them.


