FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

THE SONG WE CREATE TOGETHER

There is a Chassidic image I have always loved. A young rabbi arrived in a new town, eager to begin his work. The community welcomed him warmly, and almost immediately people began asking what he planned to change, what he hoped to build, what new ideas he would bring.

But for his first months, the rabbi did something unexpected: mostly, he listened. He sat with the older members who remembered what the synagogue had been decades earlier. He listened to parents talk about what they hoped the community might become for their children. He heard stories of beloved rabbis and teachers, of celebrations held in the sanctuary, of friendships formed in the hallways and of loved ones whose absence could still be felt in particular seats.

Finally, someone asked him, "Rabbi, when will we begin to hear your voice?" The rabbi smiled. "You already are. I am just learning what it sounds like."

Rebbe Nachman of Breslov offered a beautiful teaching about the *niggun*—the wordless melody that he saw as the unique song that each of us carries through life. He teaches that the shepherd creates a melody from the grasses and plants among which the flock grazes. Each blade of grass has its own song, and from all of those individual songs the shepherd fashions his own *niggun*. The melody belongs to him, but it is composed of the voices of the world around him.

As I approach my first High Holy Days at Temple Beth Sholom, that teaching has been very much on my mind. Since arriving in July, Alexis, the children and I have been welcomed with extraordinary warmth. And for me, these first months have been, above all, a time of listening and learning. Every conversation over coffee, lunch at Ben's or dinner at people's homes, every story shared after services, every meeting with a longtime member, every encounter with a child in our hallways adds another note.

A rabbi certainly brings his own *Torah*, experiences, passions, hopes, and *niggun* to a congregation. But I believe that, over time, the community becomes part of the rabbi's song as well. The relationships we build, the history entrusted to us, the joys we celebrate together and even the difficult chapters through which a congregation has traveled, all become part of the melody.

That is especially meaningful as we prepare for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The High Holy Days invite each of us to listen again: to the voice of the *shofar*, to the ancient melodies of our *machzor*, to one another, and perhaps most importantly, to the quieter music within ourselves.

I am still learning the *niggun* of Temple Beth Sholom. I suspect I will be learning it for many years to come. But already, I am deeply grateful for the many voices that have begun to teach it to me. As we enter a new year together, my hope is that we continue to listen carefully to one another, and that from all of our individual songs, our histories, our hopes and our dreams, we will create something beautiful together.

Shanah tovah u'metukah. May it be a year filled with sweetness, blessing, and beautiful music.

These beginnings are easy to accept and are embraced gleefully. Our sages taught us a couple of Hebrew terms that deal with change that have been cleverly translated to English as follows:

1. *Gam Zu Le Tova* – everything is for the good
2. *Meshane Makom, Meshane Mazal* – changes in latitude produce changes in attitude

Gam Zu Le Tova teaches us about outside forces that affect us and that everything that happens to us in life is for the good. Even when it's a painful occurrence, we are taught to search for the good in it because it's there, begging to be found. There is always an opportunity to learn from every event, even if we just learn to appreciate all the blessings we had before that ill event

and to also learn how to cope so we can better handle the next and perhaps even bigger challenge thrown at us. God did not create a perfect world, nor did God create perfect human beings, and our constant challenge is to accept our realities – good or bad – and learn from them so they can inform our next new beginning and make a positive force in our future.

Meshane Makom, Meshane Mazal teaches us that we have the power to change our own future – don't like your job? Find a new one. Aren't enjoying your community? Move to a new one. While persevering challenges and seeing things through are very important virtues, this teaching comes to remind us that sometimes new beginnings can be found by simply changing where we are so new positive energies can enter into our lives and change our future for the better. These decisions can be difficult and fraught with uncertainty but the courage to make such big changes can be the difference between continuing to suffer in a bad situation or making a fresh start towards a bright future.

I pray that we all embrace new opportunities this year that will better our lives – and if you find that you are happy where you are then you are truly blessed and this Rosh Hashannah you will have an opportunity to thank God for all your blessings.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A SEASON OF RENEWAL, A YEAR OF PRESENCE

There is something wonderfully familiar about the arrival of the High Holidays. The melodies return. The *machzor* comes out of its place on the shelf. We hear the ancient words that generations of Jews have spoken before us. And then there is the sound of the *shofar*-ancient, startling, impossible to ignore.

And yet, every year, we hear it differently.

Perhaps that is one of the great gifts of the High Holiday season. Judaism gives us permission-indeed, encourages us-to begin again.

This year, that invitation feels particularly meaningful to me. Since joining TBS in January, I have had the privilege of beginning a new chapter alongside all of you. I have been welcomed into this community with tremendous warmth and generosity, and I have spent these first months discovering what makes this congregation so special.

And what a year to begin.

This year, TBS celebrates its 75th anniversary.

Seventy-five years is more than a milestone. It is a remarkable testament to the power of community.

Our 75th anniversary gives us a beautiful opportunity to do what the High Holidays ask us to do: look backward with gratitude and forward with hope.

As we celebrate 75 years, we stand on the shoulders of the people who built this synagogue before us. We inherit their dreams, their traditions, their commitment and their love for this congregation.

And now, in our own time, we have the opportunity-and the responsibility-to decide what we will add to the story.

The High Holidays ask us to look closely at what it means to be a part of a community- and at what it means to be a person continually capable of becoming something more.

One of the central ideas of these days is *teshuvah*. We often translate it as *repentance*, but its root - *shuv* - means to *return*. *Teshuvah* isn't about becoming a different person. It's about returning to who you already were beneath the accumulated noise of a year: the missed calls, the short tempers, the promises we meant to keep. The High Holidays ask us not to reinvent ourselves, but to come home to ourselves.

We return to our best selves. We return to our values. We return to the people from whom we may have become distant. We return to God, to *Torah* and to the possibilities that exist within us.

Teshuvah also reminds us that Judaism does not believe we are defined forever by who we were yesterday. There is always the possibility, and the hope, of change.

That is a profound idea.

The High Holidays do not simply ask, *What did I do this year?* They ask more challenging questions: *Who am I becoming?* and *Who do I want to become?*

And that question belongs to communities as well as individuals.

The *Torah* teaches us again and again that we are bound together by covenant. We do not travel through Jewish life alone. Our individual choices affect the larger community, and the health of our community depends upon the contributions, kindness and presence of each of us.

The *shofar* calls us to wake up—to listen more carefully, to pay attention, to notice what we may have overlooked. Its sound can be understood as an alarm, but I also think of it as an invitation:

Wake up to your life.

Wake up to the people around you.

Wake up to what is possible.

On Rosh Hashanah, we'll hear the *shofar* - a sound with no words, older than language, calling us back to attention. On Yom Kippur, we'll stand together, admit what needs admitting, and be inscribed together, we pray, for another year. And on Sukkot, we'll sit under a roof open to the stars, reminded that permanence was never really the point - presence was.

As we celebrate 75 years of presence, that lesson feels especially close to home. I invite each of us to consider how we might use our unique gifts to make our presence felt during the coming year, so that 75 years from now, a future Executive Director will be writing about the 150th anniversary of our beloved congregation.

May the coming year bring sweetness to our homes, courage to our hearts, curiosity to our minds and kindness to our interactions. May we find the strength to repair what is broken, the wisdom to appreciate what is whole and the openness to welcome whatever new possibilities the year may bring.

L'shanah tova tikatevu v'techatemu. May we all be inscribed and sealed for a year of health, happiness, peace, love, meaning and sweetness.

FLUID FUTURES/MELTING LANDS

Two-person exhibition: Yona Verwer and Ellen Alt

ARTISTS' STATEMENT

Fluid Futures/Melting Lands is a visual exploration of water and ice, examining the intertwined crises of ocean pollution and melting glaciers.

Once the planet's living waters, the oceans have become a stark symbol of humanity's environmental impact. Plastic pollution has reached even the Mariana Trench, while microplastics are now found in marine life, drinking water, and the human body. Growing up near the North Sea in the Netherlands, a country shaped by rivers, canals, lakes, and coastlines, much of it below sea level, Verwer developed a profound relationship with water that continues to inform this work.

At the same time, melting glaciers are transforming the Earth's landscape. As sea levels rise and threaten coastal communities, land long buried beneath ice is being revealed. Through mixed-media works, Alt explores the shifting balance between water and land, imagining what may emerge as the ice recedes. The glaciers are envisioned as vaults of planetary memory, preserving Earth's history within their frozen depths. As they melt, they release those memories, offering both a record of the past and a reminder of humanity's enduring capacity for connection and communication.

Healing the world's waters and ice is not optional; it is essential to healing the planet itself. As *Pirkei Avot* 2:16 teaches: *You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it.*



Verwer's *Fluid Futures* series depicts marine life entangled in, or navigating through plastic debris, reflecting both the fragility of ocean ecosystems and the urgent responsibility to protect them. In Jewish tradition, *Tikkun Olam* (repairing the world) and the related concept of *Tikkun HaYam* (repairing the seas) call upon humanity to become active partners in restoring creation.

Alt's *The White Series*, is a ten-part narrative, exploring the delicate equilibrium between ice and water, salt and fresh, liquid and frozen. It asks what is lost as glaciers disappear and what new landscapes,

histories, and possibilities are revealed in their absence. Embedded throughout the series is the same call to *Tikkun Olam*: the responsibility to restore balance, sustain life, and protect the interconnected ecosystems upon which all species depend.

Both artists' practice is deeply rooted in Jewish environmental ethics. The *Torah* instructs humanity *to till and tend the Earth* (Genesis 2:15), while the principle of *Bal Tashchit* (do not destroy), originating in Deuteronomy and expanded by the rabbis of the Talmud, prohibits wastefulness and needless destruction. Together, these teachings provide an enduring ethical framework that informs every aspect of the work, positioning art as both witness and call to action.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST, A VISION FOR THE FUTURE

How many of us remember returning to school after summer break and being asked to write the proverbial *what did you do on vacation* essay? So, if you will allow, I will share with you my 2026 summer essay.

This summer, I attended a Women's League for Conservative Judaism Convention for the very first time. I was fortunate to attend with three friends from TBS and so, though I didn't really know what to expect, I knew I would be in good company.

We reached our destination in Alexandria, Va. fairly smoothly, had some check-in mishaps, but quickly started meeting and greeting approximately 400 women from across the US and Canada gathered in the same place to *engage, enrich and empower* each other. And this we did as together we prayed, benched, studied and shared our successes and our challenges. I will share with you that for me, the sound and experience of benching *Birkat Ha Mazon* with hundreds of women in a hotel in Virginia made my heart dance.

I want to share with you a pivotal event for me.

By way of background, I grew up in a Conservative congregation in Queens which merged with another congregation some years ago. I have not been a regular member there for many decades, but my ties to that community and my memories of all that we did together remain strong.

As we were being called for group picture of our BQLI region, I heard a very familiar name. It was a true blast from my past. I thought *it can't be that person, she would be close to 90*, but it was her! She is as vibrant and active as I remember her when we worked together in high school, as she spearheaded our synagogue's Israel at 25 Celebration. 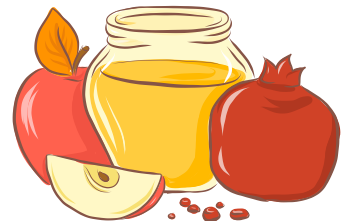

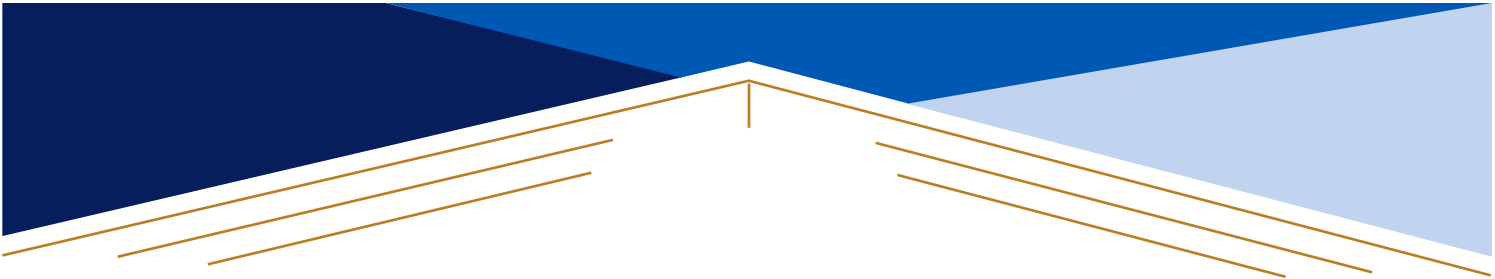
