My Facebook Confession



I made a confession to my High School students. I told them that although I have a Facebook account and a Twitter account in addition to my email account, they were set up by others who insist that, “the rabbi” has to be accessible on Facebook and Twitter!

And then I confessed that I look at my Facebook and Twitter accounts but I rarely post anything and I added that I am drowning in email.

I can see where Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and whatever is the flavor of the month format, all have potential – even for a rabbi. And the people who set it up for me – are probably right – I really could benefit by using them to help me do what I do as a rabbi, which is to teach Torah. Our newly revamped tbsroslyn.org web site is a model of how we can improve the way we communicate with others by improving our presence in cyberspace. My problem is that I just don't have the time! I can't even keep up with my email. No matter how many emails I answer – they seem to pile up in my inbox faster than I can dispense with them – and now I am supposed to update my Facebook page and send regular updates on Twitter. And post more pictures to Instagram? What is a rabbi to do?

Well maybe I could do what some of the movie and rock stars do – maybe I could hire someone to keep my Facebook and Twitter account up to date. But, doesn't that defeat the whole purpose of these tools? Isn't the whole point that you get instant access to someone? And if the instant access you are getting is not *the* someone, but merely someone who is standing in for that someone – doesn't that really defeat the point of the whole thing?

Now, this is not intended to be a rant against Facebook or Twitter or even email for that matter (though while I am writing this letter 7 more emails have appeared in my inbox – ughh!) No, I am smart enough to understand that to oppose them would be to merely label me as an old fogey who just doesn't get it. I get it; I just am having trouble dealing with it.

So then I proceeded to tell our high school students that is why I love Passover. Passover in general and the Passover Seder in particular is the antithesis of Twitter or Instagram. Joining family and friends and observing the several thousand-year-old customs of the Passover Seder. Physically sitting around the same table and opening an old fashioned book (the *Haggaddah*) and participating in a several hour conversation, meal and ritual. In an age of podcasts,

Kindles and Twitter – it does seem a bit, well old school.

I have no doubt that there will be Seders this year where loved one's far away join in via Facetime. Email will be used to share materials for the Seder. And I would not even be surprised if some people set up their laptop on the Seder table to share a cute YouTube Video on Passover that well, you just had to see. But still, at its core – the Seder is a real time, person to person, ritual and a lengthy one at that! It is a custom and tradition that challenges our contemporary notions of communication and community.

This month at TBS we will mark Purim and after Passover we will observe *Yom Hashaoah* and *Yom Haatzmaut*. On March 3rd Sisterhood is sponsoring a program on Hamantaschen baking, you could join us for the Molly Chernofsky z"l Community Cinema Series. On the Shabbat of March 27th and 28th, Dr. Joshua Kulp the

Rosh Yeshiva of the Conservative Yeshiva in Jerusalem will be teaching at a Shabbat dinner on Friday night; at Services on Shabbat morning and after kiddush as well. And we will do all these things together, in real time. There is something nice about each of these moments – and what they all have in common is that like our Passover Seders we will celebrate them together.

I know I still have to figure out how I am going to master Facebook & Twitter and get a better control of my email. I know that

ultimately it matters less whether they will make my life better or not – the truth is that for better or worse, that is where life is being lived these days.

But, all of these upcoming events at TBS remind us that life is not only there – online. Life, at its best is still what goes on person to person. As much as I need to find the time for Facebook, it cannot come at the expense of my time listening and learning and being with those I love. I can't give a hug on Facebook, or a kiss. I can't wipe away a tear or give a joyful nudge – these are things we can only do when we are really there for each other, with each other.

I hope you will come join us as we celebrate Purim. And I hope you will have a joyous Seder. And I hope these holidays will be filled with joy as you will be surrounded by people – by family and friends. And I hope you will make the time to join us for *Yom Hashaoah* and for *Yom Haatzmaut* and for our *Shabbaton*. It is important that we do these things together.

As your rabbi, I promise to learn how to better manage my email, keep my Facebook page more up to date and use Twitter to better update those who are already following me. But as your rabbi, I also promise that if you come to shul – I will be there, and we can hug and laugh and cry- together.

Finally, Some Real News About Real Life!



I recently read a heart-warming article in the Israeli daily Yediot Achronot (YNET) that was so inspiring I felt that I must share it with you. It is a story about overcoming one of the most real things in life – death.

The article described Tamar Grossman, an Oncology nurse in Israel that traveled literally to the end of the world to help one of her patients fulfill his dreams before he died.

Omri Nissim began his ordeal as a cancer patient at the young age of 35, suffering from Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. He spent months in and out of an Israeli hospital receiving chemotherapy treatments administered by nurse Tamar and they became very close friends. Eventually, he was pronounced cancer free but within a year his pain returned twofold and after some testing he received the terrible diagnosis of Stage 4 Pancreatic Cancer, a virtually incurable disease. The doctor told Omri that he had about 6 or 7 months left to live. When Nurse Tamar entered his room his words to her were instinctive: "I'm going to die and there is nothing I can do about it". She, however, had a different perspective: "On the contrary, Omri, you are going to live the next few months and make every second count. By tomorrow morning I want you to make a list of everything you ever wanted to do and I will help you do it all".

In the morning, Omri indeed handed her a long list of the hobbies he always wanted to try but never found the time or the money. It included woodworking, pottery, archery, glass blowing and blacksmithing. It also included trips to Australia and Las Vegas and a very special request to go see the phenomenon called the Northern Lights.

Tamar knew that to fulfill Omri's entire list would be extremely expensive, especially considering that he needed round-the-clock medical attention while traveling which meant flying long distances could only be achieved on special medical transport planes costing \$25,000 per trip. That meant getting him to the three places he mentioned would require over \$75,000!

Tamar was determined. She posted Omri's plight with a photo of his handwritten "bucket-list" to her Facebook page and much to her surprise, within a few hours she had received thousands of

replies from people from all walks of life offering their expertise for free to help Omri experience the hobbies he listed. In the weeks that followed they attended classes together in pottery, glass blowing and all of the other hobbies on his list, all for free. Still, Tamar knew she had to find a way to achieve the seemingly impossible and raise almost \$100,000 to make Omri's dream of traveling come true.

One day, she got an email from the famed Make-a-Wish Foundation to say that they had seen her post, which went viral around the world, and they offered to pick up the cost of traveling to the three places Omri asked to see, including travel expenses for her and his mother to join him!!

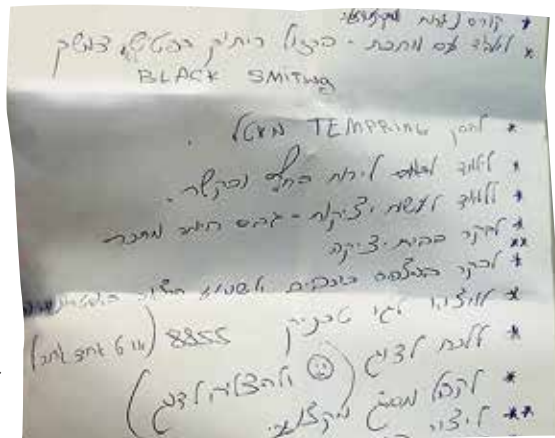
Tamar was elated but still had to deal with all the daunting bureaucratic issues: getting large quantities of medicines and permission to move him, renting a wheelchair, finding a portable oxygen generator, looking for an agency that would approve insurance for a terminally ill patient to fly. One of the

doctors at the hospital, Dr. Shani Breuer, saw her post and wrote all the needed prescriptions and Omri's mother traveled to pharmacies across Israel to buy the drugs. A security officer at Ben Gurion Airport asked her to call him as soon as they got to the airport so he could move them smoothly to their gate.

In Australia, Omri met long-lost family he had never met before. In Las Vegas Omri and Tamar together with his mother Dita enjoyed every show available and then for five nights of his last month of life they followed the search for the Northern Lights. Seeing them is never guaranteed but this time,

like a gift from heaven, they appeared every night.

Sadly, Omri passed just a few days after his return to Israel but his celebration of life in his last few months remains as a reminder to all of us that every moment is precious and putting our most treasured desires off to some day that may never come is a huge mistake. At the same time we are reminded that a very special friend like nurse Tamar can play a most important role in reminding us at our darkest moments how much life is worth living even if it is for a short while. The real tragedy is not in the dying but rather in the wasting of our life on anxious worrying about things out of our control. The only thing we can truly control is how we enjoy today while we still can.

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI URI ALLEN

The Four Types of Jews



Last year in the Spring edition of The Bulletin, I shared with you a piece from Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel on the topic of civil rights in America. The excerpted passage was a part of our Passover seders growing up (it still is) and has become a foundational text for me as a rabbi and as a Jew. In fact there are many parts of my seder experience over the years that I regard in that way.

I would like to share another one with you this year. It is a riff on the Four Children. Instead it is the Four Kinds of Jews. This reading first appeared in a Zionist newspaper in Berlin in the 1930's - a time when the issues of the day were not so different from our own. What does Jewish identity look like? How can I be fully Jewish and American (German in this case) at the same time? What should a Jew's relationship be towards Zionism? What should our relationship be towards the Jewish people and to the world?

Though somewhat anachronistic, as it is over 80 years old, as a text I still find it brimming with interpretive opportunities. As you read and consider these typologies I invite you to ask yourself, with which one do you identify the most? Which type challenges you? If you were to write a new version of this for the 21st century, what would be your paradigm? What is missing from the conversation?

From all of us at Temple Beth Sholom, we wish you and your family a meaningful and joyous Passover.

THE RESPONSIBLE JEW

When Hitler took power in Germany, the Nazis promulgated a decree that all Jews must wear the yellow star. On April 1, 1933, the Jewish Review of Berlin, a Zionist newspaper, editorialized concerning what the Jewish response should be to the new Nazi law that all Jews were required to wear a yellow star. "The answer must be clear. It must be that briefest of sentences Moses spoke to the Egyptians- *Ivri anochi*, I am a Jew."

What does declaring *Ivri anochi* – I am a Jew – mean to you? What action does it demand once we make that statement?

THE IRRESPONSIBLE JEW

A Jew cannot be a human being without fully becoming a Jew. The mistake of the assimilationist comes from thinking that the less Jew she is the more human she is. On the contrary, she is less a human being and to that very extent, she is less a Jew...

How do you think fully embracing our Judaism can make us more human? What are your obstacles to making that a reality? How can we at Har Zion Temple walk with you on your journey?

THE FOOLISH JEW

Rabbi Hanoch of Alexandria said: *The real exile of Israel in Egypt is that they learned to endure it.*

Our Sages added: *Not only was it necessary to take the Jews out of Egypt, but it was also necessary to take Egypt out of the Jews.*

What are the "Egypt" in your life that you endure? What do you need not only to be taken out of that Egypt but to have it removed from you as well?

THE INDIFFERENT JEW

For the one who does not know how to ask, tell him that Chaim Weitzman once said: *A nation does not receive a state on a silver platter.*

What are the givens in your life? What do you do to ensure that you don't take them for granted?

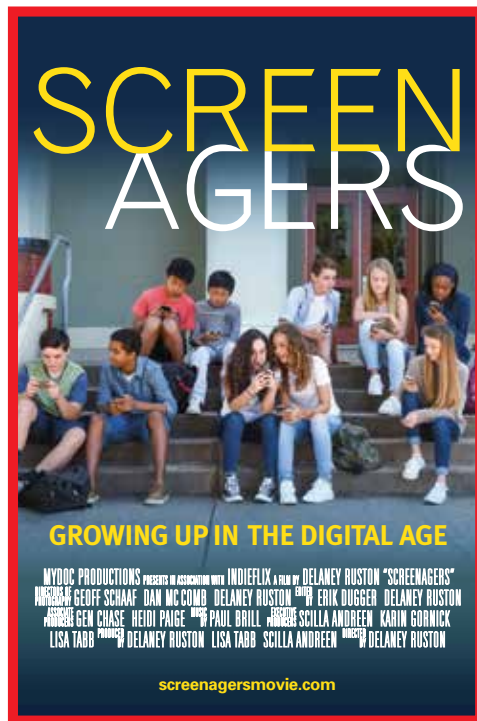

Congressman Tom Suozzi and Linda Beigel Schulman Discuss Gun Violence

There was Columbine, Sandy Hook, then Las Vegas, Parkland, Orlando, Virginia Beach, Newtown, El Paso, Pittsburgh, the list of senseless mass shootings just keeps growing. The total number of deadly mass shootings in the United States in 2019 comes out to an average of one every 15 days. In total *nearly 40,000 people died from guns in the U.S. last year, the most in 50 Years.*

With gun violence running rampant, The Social Action Committee of Temple Beth Sholom reached out to our Congressmen, Former Congressman Ackerman and Congressman Tom Suozzi to try to see what we as a community could do to affect change that would begin to address this frightening phenomenon.

Congressman Suozzi offered to join Linda Beigel Schulman, a former member of Temple Beth Sholom and mother of Scott J. Beigel, teacher and coach at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland Florida, on January 30th, at Temple Beth Sholom to address the community about gun violence.

On February 14, 2018 a 19-year-old former student entered Marjory Stoneman Douglas wielding an AR-15. While trying to save his students from the spray of bullets Scott's life was ended. After the death of her only son, Linda dedicated herself

to work on legislation and community engagement that would help to curtail gun violence throughout the country. She was instrumental in the passage of the red flag law in Florida. A law that allows law enforcement to investigate and remove guns, as necessary, from individuals that have shown signs of mental instability.



In their address, both Congressman Suozzi and Mrs. Schulman emphasized that the fact they are not advocating the reversal of the Second Amendment and the banning of guns. They freely admit that we can never ensure that all gun violence disappears, rather they are supporting actions that help make the ownership and handling of guns safer. By making our voices heard in support of red flag laws, background checks and gun safety classes we can join this effort and become part of the

solution by working towards helping to reduce violent deaths and injuries caused by guns.

A Scott J. Beigel Memorial Fund, has been founded. The fund is dedicated to providing scholarships to under privileged children who have been touched by gun violence to attend a sleep away camp. Donations can be made at www.scottjbeigelmemorialfund.com.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Meaningful Experiences to Engage Youth



How do we have a purposeful engagement with our students and empower them with a sense of meaning and belonging?

Part of our students' journey toward becoming a Bar/Bat Mitzvah at Temple Beth Shalom includes becoming involved in social action or mitzvah projects. We encourage the students and families to begin the mitzvah project quest early in the b'nei mitzvah process in order to allow students not only to explore different areas in

need in our local community but also to possibly discover areas of personal interest by investigating different organizations that may spark an interest and curiosity in the students which may eventually turn into a passion.

In order to start the process of mitzvah inquiry and engagement we ask the students and families to answer the following essential questions:

What am I good at? What do I like to do? What bothers me about world issues that I actually want to help? Do I know anyone that needs my help?

Over the years, we found that students and families were having a hard time answering these questions and also had a difficult time carving out the time to talk and go out into the community for an experience such as visiting a shelter with their children. Shifts in school expectations and extra-curricular activities have over-crowded other meaningful opportunities for families and have been dominating their time. Parents crave to provide meaningful experiences for their children but find it almost impossible when competing with school, family obligation and social engagements.

The more we talked about these topics we noticed that students and parents do want to get involved in chesed/kindness opportunities but live such busy lives that the opportunities are so seldom and limited. One thing that did resonate is that parents wanted ongoing/long term opportunities for their kids to engage in meaningful and helpful interaction in their local communities which will be built into the Religious School program.

So off I went on a journey to find an opportunity for TBS up and coming b'nei mitzvah students to have a **Gemilut Chasadim project - acts of loving kindness** which is a non-financial endeavor. Giving of one's time and talent and effort and making personal

connections in our local community.

Therefore, I reached out to TBS talented and dedicated staff and together with Hanna Harel, I went on a journey to apply for a grant through the Legacy Heritage Foundation. This grant allows us, over a four-year period, to bring our Zayin students (7th graders) to the Atria Senior Center in Roslyn Harbor. It is our goal and belief that our students and the senior community will learn from one another, engage with one another, and through a variety of fun and inclusive activities, become friends. More important than that is that intergenerational engagement was taking place. We were fortunate to have been granted this enormous opportunity.

Through this grant, our students have monthly scheduled activities with the seniors and their program has evolved into something greater and more wonderful than what we ever imagined.

We thought that the students were the ones who will mostly engage the seniors but as it turns out, these meetings have created bonds and buddies beyond what we anticipated. Students can't wait to return each month to the Atria and the level of enthusiasm increases from gathering to gathering. It is a sheer joy and blessing to watch the students arrive at the Atria Center in Roslyn and race over to their senior buddies and see how they are doing. Both seniors and students thrive at each gathering through their mutual interactions.



So when people ask me today how to engage our b'nei mitzvah students, I tell them to find connections with people, the community and with family. These deep connections can only happen when we create opportunities and carve out time for deep and real experiences. It is important that we teach the theory and Jewish texts behind all that we do regarding Jewish values (middot). But when combining the texts into actual reality, we are creating experiences that will last a lifetime during these formative years of our students.

I am so grateful for this great Legacy Heritage Better Together grant. But even more so I am grateful to the students who are investing their time, effort, energy and their hearts in connecting with these amazing, caring seniors in our community. They reciprocate with so much love and care for our students as well.

I want to extend an enormous heartfelt thank you to our dedicated staff, Rabbi Moskowitz, Susan Daniels, Silvia Kogan and Hanna Harel, grant coordinator, for enriching the lives of our students and seniors in the Roslyn community.

Our next open house is scheduled for March 8th

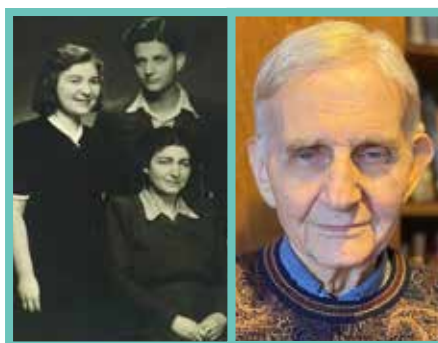

Gdank, Zachor, Remember

On January 27, 1945, Auschwitz, the Nazi concentration camp where more than one million people were murdered, was liberated by the Red (Russian) Army. Of the 7,000 prisoners that were left there, after the German Army evacuated and started the death march, was a teenage boy named Erwin Forley. Mr. Forley, a member of Temple Beth Sholom, grew up in Munkacs, Czechoslovakia. In 1944, at the age of 16, he and his family were transported in cattle cars and taken to Auschwitz. Several of his family members perished there. Please join us on April 20, 2020 at 7 PM as Mr. Forley shares his poignant story at Temple Beth Sholom's Yom Hashoah Commemoration.
