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FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

In my last article I wrote about the different calendars we live by as American Jews. The secular calendar and the Jewish calendar. This month I would like to focus on the Jewish calendar only as we celebrate and/or commemorate no less than SEVEN days which are of significant importance to us.

They are: Purim, Rosh Chodesh Nisan, Passover (*Pesach*), Yom HaShoah, Rosh Chodesh Iyyar, Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzmaut.

This is a lot. A lot of celebration, and remembrance as well. It is a wonderful snapshot of what it means to be a Jew living in the free country of the United States of America, as a Jew living post the Holocaust and as a Jew living with the reestablishment of the State of Israel.

Purim is a fun filled holiday which we will celebrate here at TBS with the roll-out (literally) of the new amazing *Megillah*, which you have heard so much about. It is an incredible work of art that we will read from on the evening of March 6th and on the morning of March 7th. I hope that you will join us.

On this joyous day, we will celebrate with the traditional carnival as well. It is also a day on which we share gifts with friends – mishloach manot – and remember the needy by giving to matanot l'evyonim.

Pesach is all about freedom, celebration, the *sedarim*, food and family! I hope that you get to celebrate. Please join me in a class I will be giving on leading a *seder* and what you can bring to the table.

Now, I would like to focus on Yom HaShoah, Yom Zikaron and Yom Ha'Atzmaut which fall on April 18th, 25th and 26th. These are the newest days on our Jewish calendar. They teach us that we can always commemorate and celebrate as needed.

Yom HaShoah is Holocaust Remembrance Day. As survivors become fewer and fewer, it is imperative to be able to engage with them and learn their stories first-hand. Please see the related article about the program here at TBS. Yellow candles will be available courtesy of our Men's Club. May the memories of all who perished be for an ever-lasting blessing.

Yom HaZikaron April 24/25 is a very important day on the Israeli calendar. It is dedicated to remembering fallen soldiers and

people who were killed in terrorist attacks. Everyone in Israel has someone to remember – a dad, a child, a mom, a cousin and/or a friend. Israel is a small country; 24,969 Israeli Jews have been killed in war and attacks from pre-state to today, and over 30,000 have been injured.

The entire country comes to a halt – literally – for a moment of silent tribute to the fallen so that "their memories will be for a blessing!"

The solemnity of the day is counteracted by the joy of Yom Ha'Atzmaut. We will have just read in the *Haggadah* that we went "from despair to light." That is what happens in Israel between the two days. It is very powerful to be a part of that transformation in time.

Yom Ha'Atzmaut is Israel's "July 4th" when all Jewish Israelis celebrate. Israelis are off from work, there are enthusiastic musical celebrations and BBQ's all over the country in celebration of 75 years of the Jewish State.

We are living in times of amazing events in Jewish history.
We prayed for 1,900 to be back in Zion, and now we get to live it! Join us as we celebrate the miraculous rebirth of

UNHEALTHY POLITICAL POLARIZATION, HERE AND IN ISRAEL



Politics here and in Israel have become polarized, forcing constituents to choose the far right or the far left without much to vote for in the middle. Going back a few years now, US politics have split the country into red and blue without much room for the purple you should get when the two mix. In other words, political polarization demands that if you identify as blue you cannot even listen to a red point of view and vice versa. This is

unhealthy as it takes the most basic ingredient of democracy out of the equation which is the right to discourse and to argue and to opine but then to reach a compromise that is in the best interest of the entire country, not just

your chosen party.

Israel just had an election that has put it in exactly the same situation. So much so, that the left point of view has been erased completely as the far left Meretz party, which has been part of the coalition government for many years, could not even get enough votes to pass the threshold to be included in the government. Therefore the current coalition government is very right leaning. This has emboldened the

right to propose laws that are right-sided without any balance from the left. This is not only unhealthy but dangerous. First of all, this alienates half the country. Now, one can say that its the left's own fault because they stayed home due to apathy and feeling sidelined and did not come out to vote so they deserve not to be counted – and there is some truth to that. Now they are out in the streets by the thousands demonstrating every day and night, railing against these newly proposed laws which threaten Israel's democracy that the left has worked so hard for years to achieve. Since Israel is primarily a Jewish state, the right is usually religious and the left is usually secular. The left seculars are feeling very threatened by the current right-leaning government's efforts to pass laws that will restrict the left's secular lifestyle by, for instance, not allowing busses and trains to operate on Shabbat and holidays and by forcing entertainment venues to close as well. Secular Israelis enjoy Shabbat in a very different way than religious Israelis do and for the religious right to enact such laws is taken by the seculars on the left to be tantamount to taking away their right to live freely as they wish. This polarization is felt on many other fronts such as who can pray at the Western Wall,

how one can get married in Israel or convert to Judaism in Israel, whether supermarkets and restaurants are allowed to sell non-kosher products, etc. Clearly, this is unhealthy for a country that has prided itself on its strive towards full democracy.

Perhaps, the daily and nightly demonstrations by thousands on the left are the best way to see there is indeed a thriving democracy in Israel. There are many countries in the world and especially in that part of the world that do not allow their citizens the right to demonstrate against the ruling government. Some of these countries even punish demonstrators with death as traitors while others will mobilize their army to crush such demonstrations. Thankfully Israel is and hopefully always will be a society where peaceful demonstrations are not only welcomed but encouraged as part of a healthy process to allow all of its

citizens to be heard. Hopefully the right will listen and respond kindly to reach compromises that will benefit all of Israel's citizens on both sides of the spectrum and in the middle. This is what democracy demands and rightfully so.

The Bible refers to Israel as the land that flows with milk and honey and I always thought this was literal and referred to Israel's natural abundance, but in thinking about democracy maybe this also means that when citizens confront each other, they should do as the Bible instructs - with milk and honey. They should sit down, break bread together, talk in sweet notes that

speak the language of brotherhood. Israel is a Jewish state that was created by Jews for all Jews and if the right doesn't pay heed to their brothers and sisters on the left, they are ignoring and alienating their own family.

May God give all Israelis the wisdom to see each other, to hear each other and to feel each other. Only then, can freedom and democracy truly reign in our promised land.

YOU DESERVE A BREAK TODAY



hat do women want? It's a question that men – and pop culture – have famously been asking for decades. In the 80s, Cyndi Lauper memorably posited that "girls just want to have fun." In recent years, protestors at women's marches across the country turned that song title into a rallying cry for equality, carrying signs proclaiming that "girls just want to have fundamental rights." Today, a quick dip into the world of blogs

and social media reveals that what women want most – more than anything else they can imagine – is a break. Women are busier than ever, and as they juggle tasks like work, child care, and elder care, they're increasingly desperate for a breather from their endless responsibilities. At the very least, women want something to take the edge off, something that will help them shoulder the many burdens that they bear every day.

One response to this feeling of female burnout has been an element of modern society that many call "mommy wine culture." Mommy wine culture is a recent trend in which more and more young mothers have been turning to alcohol to help them cope with the everyday stresses of parenting. This trend has led to an explosion of mommy wine culture merchandise, like wine tumblers emblazoned with the slogan "Mom Juice" or T-shirts that announce to the world that you run on "coffee, wine, and Amazon Prime."

I don't begrudge anyone the pleasure of having some wine at the end of a tough day (or even a not-so-tough day) – but I do have an issue with mommy wine culture. Having a few drinks may give you a break at the end of the day – but it doesn't give you the kind of break that you really need – a break that nourishes you spiritually and emotionally.

Not long ago, Good Housekeeping magazine published an article entitled "Here's Exactly What's Wrong with Mommy Wine Culture." The author writes, "What moms really need isn't wine. What we need — collectively and as individuals — is support." I couldn't agree more. We need support from our spouses, our friends, and our communities. We need the kind of support that affords us time to truly take care of ourselves, body and soul. What we need even more than a glass of wine is a community

that gives us the tools to refresh and renew our spiritual energy.

TBS, through our amazing Sisterhood, will be giving women the opportunity to find exactly that kind of deep connection and spiritual respite when we hold our second annual Women's Seder on Thursday evening, March 23. We'll sing and reflect together and explore the elements of our tradition that nourish our souls and give us the strength to face all of life's demands. I encourage women of all

ages to join us for a transformative evening featuring joy, friendship, and delicious food.

To all of you – men and women, parents and non-parents – I hope that the Passover season and its holy days provides you with meaningful opportunities to take a break from the stresses of everyday life, and to feel strengthened and refreshed.

Thirty-five years ago, we moved into our current home and our Rabbi shared that we were moving in *Adar*, the lucky month. He pointed out that it says in the *Talmud* "when *Adar* enters, we increase in joy" and this is the time when our fortune is especially healthy and good. So it is with optimism that I move forward from winter to spring. It is also the perfect time to reflect on what has transpired in the last two months

and look forward to what will take place in March and April.

Facility Issues The Flood

Many of you are probably unaware that the Religious School and Day Camp Offices along with 3 classrooms experienced a flood on what was a bitter cold Christmas Day. This was due to a burst sprinkler head and a break in a joint in the pipes that run through the ceiling. Adjusters, inspectors, mitigators, and estimators have all been through the building and we are finally able to move ahead with the restoration of walls, floors, outlets and IT and phone wiring. I want to offer special thanks to our maintenance staff who rushed in and took appropriate action to remove the 2+ inches of water and dry out spaces as quickly as possible. Staff normally housed in the impacted areas are temporarily, and as best as could be managed, housed in other parts of the building and have approached the inconvenience with good humor and patience. Work has begun to restore and paint the sheetrock walls, repair the sprinkler system, and select and ultimately lay new flooring.

The Auditorium and Chapel

Our auditorium and the chapel wall dividers were stripped of all the tattered wallpaper, and they are now freshly painted. We are ordering 200 new stackable banquet chairs to replace those in bad disrepair. Congregants have already expressed their excitement with the change, and families who have upcoming simchas are enthusiastic about sponsoring a *kiddush* in a refurbished space.

Kiddush

I enjoy watching as the community gathers in the auditorium for special events, sharing stories, laughing, meeting new people and getting to know each other better. During *kiddush* connections are built that help make TBS a strong, vibrant community.

This is in no small part why the Wertenteil Fund was set up in memory of Jack Wertenteil z''l. His daughter Tina Rotstein has shared that spending time with fellow congregants over *kiddush* was meaningful and very special to her father and each year the family contributes so as to sustain the fund.

More recently the children of Sam & Sylvia Brenner *z"I* (Joel & Susan Brenner, Ray & Ruth Brenner, Ilene & Steven Sussman and Karen Brenner & Robert Stein) endowed "The *Simcha* (Sam's Hebrew name) Fund", with the donation designated to help defray some of the cost of *kiddush* specifically on Birthday and Anniversary *Shabbats*. We are so appreciative of this new gift to TBS.

Lifecycle milestones such as *aufrufs*, weddings, baby namings, *yahrtzeits*, *Bar/Bat Mitzvahs*, birthdays or anniversaries, are all deeply significant occasions to share with the congregation. We welcome full or co-sponsorships to cover the cost of *kiddush* which runs in excess of \$100,000 annually. Gathering for *kiddush* is about so much more than food – you are encouraging the process of deepening and weaving the bonds of community. THE ENDURING POWER OF SACRED JEWISH TEXTS



Sacred Jewish Texts

Jews are readers. Often referred to as the "People of the Book", it is no surprise that sacred Jewish texts hold immeasurable value to us. Of course, the *Torah* is the most sacred of all texts. Each year we read it, word for word, to rediscover the values we should live by and the stories that remind us of who we are. Then on the 14th of *Adar*, we celebrate Purim and turn our attention to a different sacred text – the *Megillat* Esther – which recounts

the story of Jews being saved from the villainous Haman. We participate in the reading, hiss and boo, and bring back to life this extraordinary tale of bravery and disguise.

Here at Temple Beth Sholom Religious School, we read and delve deep into sacred Jewish texts, providing our students with a meaningful connection to the historical, cultural and social heritage of our people. This year, we've decided to take this connection one step further, utilizing hands-on learning to creatively engage with our rich history and religion. Together with the help of Rabbi and scribe, Gustavo Surazki, as well as author and educator, Jared Harél, our students have embarked upon an incredible journey to create our own Illuminated/Illustrated *Megillah*!

Experiences & Opportunities

Over the past month or so, our students have been learning and discussing the story of Purim, analyzing important themes, getting to know the main characters, and even working on their own Purim display. In addition, we've been engaging with the text via creative, hands-on writing projects that stimulate the mind and foster personal connections to Purim and its values. For example, Jared Harél has worked with students from Kitot Dalet through Zayin (4th-7th grades) to create Persona Poems, in which the children write from the perspective of a main Purim character. During Purim, we wear masks and costumes as an act of celebration, but also to commemorate how Esther first hid, then revealed her Jewish identity in order to save her people. Similarly, persona writing offers students a unique and creative lens through which to see the world anew, placing themselves directly in the shoes of Esther, Vashti, Ahashverus, Mordechai, or even Haman.

Throughout our Purim unit, TBS students have been afforded opportunities to:

• Study the *Megillah* in a deep and meaningful way with clergy, educators, authors and classmates.

- Write their own character interpretations via persona poems and creative writing
- Hear other student's creative works and interpretations
- Take part in the creation of the Illuminated/Illustrated Megillah Project
- Build and design a unique Purim display
- Attend a live and interactive Megillah Reading
- Attend and take part in a fantastic Purim Carnival
- Read from the *Megillah* on the synagogue bima (for students of *B'nai Mitzvah* age)
- Celebrate Purim in conjunction with Israel's 75th anniversary celebration
- Connect with an Israeli school in Ashkelon that is also participating in this incredible journey.

Outcomes & Goals

Whether teaching our students *Torah*, *Megillah* or the *Haggadah*, each sacred text provides us with insights into our religion and history. Simply put, they guide us toward leading more fulfilling and enriching Jewish lives. By creating our very own *Megillah* and stepping into the shoes of Purim characters, we not only strengthen our students' connections to these texts, but we reinforce the crucial lesson that they, themselves, are an essential part of our continuing Jewish story. Just as Esther found her voice and the courage to remove her mask in a moment of great adversity, so too must our children learn to be proud Jews in the face of growing antisemitism and intolerance. This *Megillah* Project is such a unique undertaking for TBS to be involved in, and it is our hope that it sparks conversations in your homes and community, reinvigorating our appreciation for these sacred and timeless texts.

FROM MAKOM

ACTIV8! TBS SOCIAL ACTION INITIATIVE



In Judaism, acts of tzedakah (charity) and rachmanut (empathy) are not simply good deeds, but essential ingredients to living a just and Jewish life. I'm proud to say

that our teens at Makom High School have taken this principle to heart, exploring various pathways to help others and engage in volunteer work. During March and April, our ACTIV8! teens have collected, made and delivered food, donated and distributed clothing, and put together care packages for elderly community members. By engaging in outreach initiatives right here in our community, they not only provide aid to those in need, but serve as excellent role models for our younger Religious School students, inspiring them to follow in their footsteps and give back. In fact, studies have shown that volunteerism can have lifelong benefits for both children and teens, helping them academically, professionally, and socially.

Aiding those who have different life circumstances can help teens become more patient and empathetic people.

3. Long-term generosity

Getting involved in philanthropic causes early in life can set up younger generations for a lifetime of generosity. Children and teens who participate in volunteerism are more likely to volunteer their time and donate to charities when they get older.

Repairing the world through acts of kindness and generosity is an essential Jewish *mitzvah*, and now that Purim is upon us, we look to Mordechai as a prime example in this regard. As a leader in a privileged position, who "sat at the city gates", the *Megillah* recounts how Mordechai understood the needs of his community. He witnessed great economic disparity and was compelled to help others. Later codified into a *mitzvah* of enduring generosity – *matanot le'evyonim* (giving to the needy) – this underlying aspect of Purim unites a socially-conscious purpose with the celebratory nature of the holiday. The story of

A few essential benefits include:

1. Increased sense of purpose

Helping others can help teens appreciate what they have and enhance their sense of purpose. Students can increase their self-confidence through the feeling of achievement they get from donating their time. Additionally, volunteering can strengthen a teen's relationship with family members when everyone serves together.

2. More empathy

Volunteerism helps our youth see that not everyone's life is like theirs. Through service, students are given the opportunity to work with a diverse population and become more socially aware. Purim teaches us to "sit at the city gates" and pay attention to the needs of our community.

Like Mordechai, our Activ8! teens are learning about systemic disparities in our society, and approach these issues with urgency and compassion. We are so proud of our *Makom* teens, and the example they have set for us all. We pray our teens continue to make meaningful change, and that with the help of their young leadership, we can collectively strengthen our commitment to social justice. After all, as Rabbi Harold Kushner stated, "When you are kind to others, it not only changes you, it changes the world."
