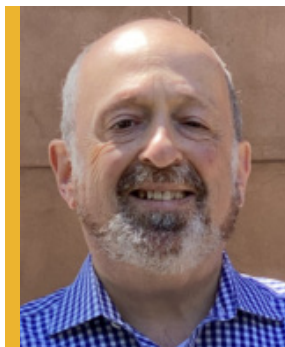

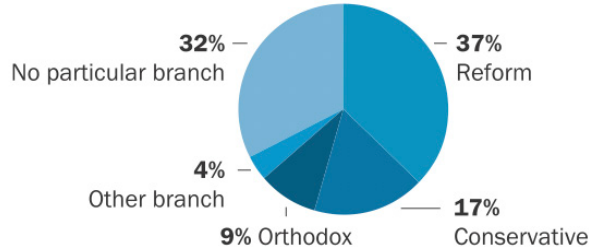
WHAT DOES THE PEW REPORT MEAN TO US?



The recent Pew report of 2020 tells us a lot about the state of American Judaism and yet I do not believe it shows us the full picture. According to the report, it is a survey sent to 68,000 households, of which only 17% responded, who are supposed to mirror the entirety of American Judaism, which according to the 2020 report counted about 7.6 million Jews. While we all understand the science behind such surveys, can the 11,500 households

that responded really tell us how 7.6 million Jews are feeling about Judaism?

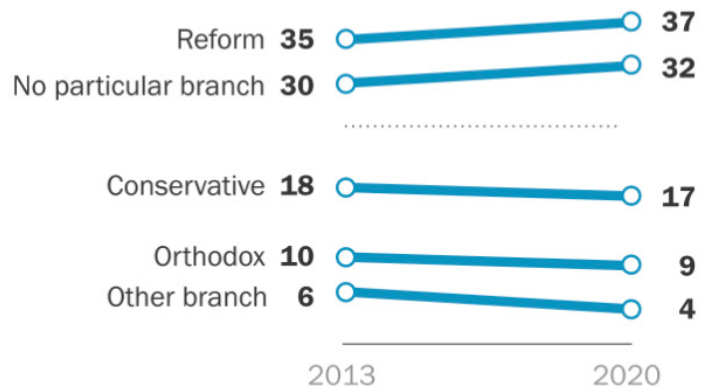
% of U.S. Jews who are ...



The last report which this one is meant to compare to was done in 2013 and the results are not actually that different. While affiliation with religious movements is down across denominations, it is not down by much, only a percentage point or two. I don't want to start giving you all the statistics from the report – you can Google it and read it for yourself – but rest assured that the picture is not pretty. Only 17% of Jews affiliate with Conservative Judaism while Reform is garnering a 37% affiliation. 4% affiliate with Reconstructionist and only 9% of American Jews consider themselves Orthodox. The remaining American Jews – at least 32% – are completely unaffiliated and uninvolved.

Yet, what does a Pew report even mean when introspecting about our own congregation? Do all those percentages matter? Yes, our congregation like many others has seen a drop in membership from 20 years ago, but there are rays of sunshine that break through – a slow but steady flow of new members, a packed ECC that feeds our sizable religious school, a busy programming calendar and an excellent staff that works hand in hand with our lay leadership. To preach about the Pew report to our own congregation is like *preaching to the choir* because we are already part of the 17% that affiliate Conservative. A better question for us to ponder is how do we get our own families to

become more engaged and more involved in what we have to offer. I am more interested in what would be our own internal pew report that may show how many in our congregation are *unaffiliated* – in other words, they pay their dues but are only marginally involved – and how to entice them to become more involved. What is it that we need to change about our services



and programs that will be more palatable to our congregants so that when they make a choice about involving themselves in our offerings, they will choose to attend. Figuring out this magical mix of ingredients is not easy in a congregation with varying desires and levels of observance, but it is a challenging task that we must embrace if we are to be effective leaders of this holy flock and it can only be achieved if we work together through an honest exchange that values all of our creative ideas and opinions. As we bid farewell in June to Rabbi Resnick who led us artfully through a year of transition and then anticipate the coming of our new Rabbi Joshua Ben Gideon, I hope and pray that all of us will be ready to take part in this monumental challenge. After all, if we are successful, it will benefit all of us and strengthen our *Kehila Kedosha*, our holy community.

LEARNING TOGETHER, FROM SINAI TO SHAVUOT



It's almost time for my favorite holiday – and what may be the best-kept secret of the Jewish festival calendar. I'm talking about Shavuot, which we celebrate this year on May 26 and 27. Although Shavuot doesn't get as much press as, say, Passover or Rosh Hashanah, it's a beautiful festival that commemorates the giving of the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai and the establishment of the covenantal relationship

between God and the Jewish people. According to the *Torah*, the entire Israelite people, having been freed from Egyptian slavery, traveled through the wilderness to Mount Sinai, where they stood at the foot of the mountain and heard God's teachings.

The *Midrash* (a collection of rabbinic texts that elucidate the *Torah* narrative) adds a provocative element to this story – it asserts that not only were the Jews of that generation present for this Divine revelation, but all of the Jews from succeeding generations were there as well. The *Midrash* explains that even though the Jews of future generations had not yet been born, their souls were present at Mount Sinai. Hence the corny joke that a Jew sometimes makes when he meets a person who looks familiar, but the two can't figure out how they know each other – one will shrug and say, "Must have seen you at Mount Sinai!" Believe it or not, this quip actually became the name of a Jewish matchmaking service called "Saw You at Sinai."

So if we were all there at Sinai, and we all learned God's commandments together, then I would suggest that each of us possesses the same ownership of *Torah* and tradition that our forebears did – from Moses to Maimonides down to contemporary scholars. *Torah* is not just for the rabbis or the professional educators – it belongs to all of us. And – if we all have the capacity to learn *Torah*, then we all have the capacity to teach something about the *Torah* to others.

On the first night of Shavuot, May 25, TBS will hold its annual *Tikun Leyl Shavuot*. The *Tikun* is an evening of *Torah* study in which we symbolically reenact the Jews' acceptance of *Torah* at Mount Sinai by learning together. Before COVID, it was a tradition for our clergy to teach *Torah* at the *Tikun*, and for members of our TBS community to teach as well, sharing their insights about Jewish sources and traditions.

Although our *Tikun* has been a bit streamlined for the past few years, it is our hope to return to the traditional model of inviting both clergy and congregants to teach at our *Tikun Leyl Shavuot*. In *Pirkei Avot* (The Ethics of the Fathers), the sage Ben Zoma teaches: "Who is wise? The one who learns from every person." Each of us is knowledgeable in our own way, whether we're well-versed in *Torah*, Israeli politics, or Jewish pop culture.

If you're interested in sharing your knowledge at our *Tikun Leyl Shavuot* this year, please reach out to me, Rabbi Resnick, or Cantor Barnoy and let us know what you'd like to teach. You don't have to be a professor – just someone who has something interesting to share that relates to Jewish culture, text, or tradition.

And even if you don't want to teach at the *Tikun*, we hope that you'll join us for a meaningful and enjoyable night of learning, conversation, and delicious dairy desserts.

We may have been together at Mount Sinai – but the most important thing for us modern-day Jews is to be together now. We add meaning and joy to our lives by coming together to learn, discuss, schmooze, and celebrate – on this holiday, and every day.

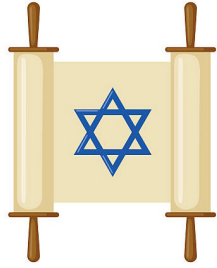

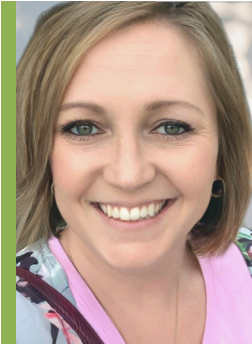

ISRAEL@75: FORTIFYING JEWISH IDENTITY THROUGH HEBREW LANGUAGE AND IMMERSION'



In an article written by David Bryfman & Barry Chazan entitled, *Israel as a Cornerstone of Jewish Identity*, the authors explain how individuals have multiple versions of themselves, as well as intersecting identities. Bryfman and Chazan conclude that while a person has not one 'personal self'...it is essential that certain core characteristics remain constant, the self. In other words, though our personal

identities are

complex and ever-shifting, having core features that anchor us to our communities and shape ourselves is of the utmost importance. Here at TBS Religious School, our top educational priority is to instill in our students a rock-solid Jewish identity, as well as a strong, meaningful connection to *Eretz Yisrael* – The Land of Israel.

In celebration of Israel's 75th Anniversary, one key question we're asking ourselves is: How do we make a student's Jewish Identity and relationship with Israel a true cornerstone of who they are? Of course, Jewish identity begins with Jewish values, heritage and *mitzvot*. The *Torah* guides us, and is our guidebook in this regard. Furthermore, celebrating and taking part in Israel-centric holidays such as Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel's Independence Day) and Yom HaZikaron (Israel's Memorial Day) are powerful ways to link Israel with identity, helping kids here in Roslyn build a connection to their Jewish *mishpacha* across the ocean.

A third facet of our Israel immersion program is cultural: the foods we eat, the music we listen to, the fashions we explore. Israeli culture is one of the yummiest, most joyous and danceable around, and we rarely miss an opportunity to showcase all that Israel has to offer. For example, we will be offering Israeli cooking, Israeli art experiences through our Youth Group and in the month of June additional *chugim* – *M'dabrim b'Ivrit* (Clubs – Youth Ulpan which is Hebrew conversational language)

Religion, heritage and culture are all vital ingredients to fostering a powerful connection with Israel, but is it enough? At TBS, we also believe that language immersion is essential to the full expression of culture and identity. Gaining familiarity with modern Hebrew can allow students to fortify Jewish identities and motivate them

to deepen their connections with Israel and the *Torah*. This is especially crucial for upcoming *b'nai mitzvah* students who are solidifying their core identities with each passing day.

Chaim Nachman Bialik, Israel's beloved poet, argued that *The golden key to Jewish education is the Hebrew language* and that identity is best shaped through the mouth and lips. To that end, one of our central Israel@75 initiatives is to offer pilot Hebrew language and immersion 'Ulpan-style' programs, beginning in May 2023. We are excited to offer this opportunity to students in *Kitot Hay* through *Zayin* (grades 5-7), *Makom* High School and *chugim*/club Israeli cultural activities for the students in the younger grades.



Dr. Samantha Vinokor-Meinrath, Senior Director of Knowledge, Ideas and Learning at the Jewish Education Project. Dr. Vinokor-Meinrath led a Jewish identity workshop to our teen madrichim which touched upon the rise of antisemitism in America.

Fostering a core Jewish identity that includes a meaningful connection to Israel can be the gift of a lifetime for our students. While personal identities are complex and ever-evolving, certain cornerstones are crucial for building a strong sense of self and community. Without a doubt, Hebrew language immersion can be a key ingredient in this regard, and we are committed to providing our students with fresh and engaging opportunities to *M'daber Ivrit*.

Wishing all our families a very Happy Spring and a Yom Ha'atzmaut *Sameach*.

OUR COLLECTIVE NARRATIVE: PASSOVER, YOM HA'ATZMATUT, AND LOOKING BACK AS A SPRINGBOARD FOR TRANSFORMATION AND SELF-GROWTH



Every spring the weather warms, flowers bloom, and we gather with loved ones to celebrate Passover (*Pesach*). Time and again, we congregate around the table to perform the ritual *Seder* – which literally means order – and repeat the story of our Jewish ancestors' enslavement and Exodus from ancient

constantly shaping us as individuals. Our resilience in bouncing back from life's setbacks often determines whether we will remain *enslaved* by our circumstances, or if we can fashion new tools and develop new strategies to cope with these challenges. A recent example of this was when Temple Beth Shalom (and the rest of the world) was forced to *adapt* in the face of a global pandemic. Though daunting, our TBS family worked together, innovated, and ultimately became a stronger, more inclusive and resilient community as a result. During times like these, when the *universe itself* pushes us out of our comfort zones, we have an opportunity to evolve and better ourselves in ways previously unimagined.

By retelling the story of our physical exile from the Land of Canaan, we come to understand how *exile* can affect us in so many ways, including spiritual or emotional exile. In recounting the ten plagues, we are reminded of the relationship between misfortune and opportunity; how things beyond our control can alter our original paths. Though we don't always realize it, these external forces may prove more helpful than harmful. For example, how often have we heard someone recount how losing their job turned out to be the best thing and a blessing in disguise? Sometimes the universe helps us when we cannot help ourselves.

We have many opportunities to sit with each other as a family like *Shabbat*, birthdays and family gatherings but it is only at Passover at the *Seder* that we are commanded to have a conversation. It affords us a vital opportunity to reflect on our ancestral family and personal histories, reminding us how far we have traveled as a people, and how much we can still achieve. In retelling the story of Passover, time and again, we reaffirm our existence and link our past to present-day Israel, our homeland's 75th anniversary, and beyond. Furthermore, celebrating *Pesach* can serve as a springboard toward understanding our own personal Exodus, our limitations and setbacks as well as our triumphs. It is now more than ever that we are experiencing the growing pains and the struggle that Israel and our people are confronting today.

In the coming year, how might we transform ourselves and our communities? How can we become a force for liberation and self-growth both for ourselves here in America and our brothers in Israel.

In our own personal journeys, we metaphorically are forced to navigate treacherous waters and cross vast deserts. Changing careers, family challenges, sicknesses and recovery from trauma are all

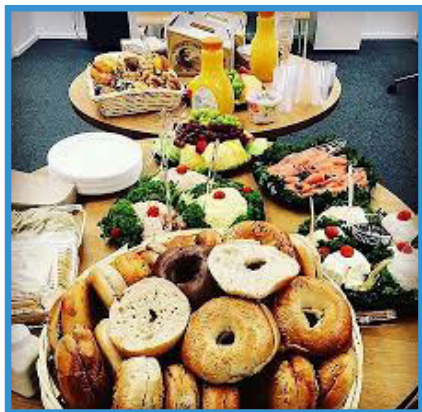
