

A swe approach the summer and the conclusion of our first year together, I am amazed at how much we have experienced together in this short time. It is hard to believe it has already been eight months since we celebrated *Kabbalat Shabbat* at Bar Beach. Cantor Barnoy led us in spirited singing as we welcomed the *Sabbath* Bride, Rabbi Rosenthal and Sharon Solomon helped lead a number of women dance during *L'cha Dodi* and I was trying my best to take it all in and begin to get to know you all.

he question of whether Ultra-Orthodox Jewish students over 18 years old living in Israel should be exempt from conscription to the IDF has always been hotly debated. It has come to the forefront after the massacre on October 7th, because of the need for all Israelis to shoulder the burden of serving in the IDF until this war against Hamas is over. This is a very different war than previous wars in Israel because of the length of time needed to complete its objectives and will test the limits of the IDF and those who do serve in it.

The reason the issue has been debated for years is because the Haredi community has actually been granted an exemption from serving in the IDF from the early days of the state of Israel in 1948 when its first prime minister, David Ben-Gurion, exempted about 400 students from military service so they could devote themselves to religious study. Who could have predicted then that 75 years later this exemption would help hundreds of thousands of Haredi students avoid military service. They are now more than 13% of Israel's population and may reach 30% within 40 years due to a high birth rate.

### FROM THE ASSOCIATE RABBI'S DESK

### **ON SOLID GROUND**

Back in 1971, singer/songwriter Carole King described the experience of falling in love in dramatic terms when she sang, I feel the earth move under my feet. Although King was singing about love, the image of feeling like the ground is unsteady beneath us is an apt way to describe many of the emotional experiences we face in life – experiences like anxiety and uncertainty. Since the horrific attack on Israel last October, we Jews have come to know all too well what it feels like to sense that the ground beneath us is not as solid as we thought it was, metaphorically speaking. The rise in anti-Semitism and anti-Zionism across the globe has destroyed the feelings of relative ease and security that we experienced before October 7.

This uneasy, unsettled feeling, of course, is one that Jews have faced in nearly every generation - and, our tradition teaches, it actually has a curious parallel in the story of the creation of the world. Back at the very beginning of the Torah, in Parashat Bereishit, we read about how the world was created in six days. In this narrative, after each day's act of creation, we see in the text a culminating note reminding us which day of creation just took place: And there was evening, and there was morning, a first day. The text goes on like this, enumerating a second day, a third day, and so on. However, when we get to Day 6, the description ends a little differently: rather than saying a sixth day, the text says

yom hashishi - the sixth day. Why is the definite article used here, but not in the descriptions of the other days?

The medieval sage Rashi offers a teaching from the Talmud that seeks to explain this discrepancy. According to this teaching, the *sixth day* noted here actually refers not to the sixth day of Creation, but to a *sixth day* that was to occur many generations in the future – the sixth day of the Hebrew month of Sivan, in the first year after the Israelites went forth from Egypt – in other words, the day when the Israelites received the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai.

According to Rashi, contrary to what we might think when we read the *Torah's* account of the primordial act of Creation, the world was not really complete by the time God was finished with that first eventful week. In fact, the entire world that God created was left in a tenuous, fragile state. In Rashi's words, all the elements of the created world were *teluyyim* – a Hebrew

word that means hanging or conditional - a state that would be resolved only if the Israelites agreed to receive the Ten Commandments when they stood at Sinai. So – even though God created the entire world in six days, all of Creation was left hanging, so to speak, waiting for the day thousands of years in the future in which the Israelites would have the choice to receive God's word, or to reject it. If they chose to enter into a relationship with God, God's act of Creation would be solidified, and the world would be strong.

Although that fateful day that our ancestors experienced at Sinai is thousands of years in our past, we continue to

celebrate the festival of Shavuot on the sixth (and seventh) of Sivan every year, commemorating the day on which our ancestors received the Ten Commandments, and rededicating ourselves to the study of Torah. This act of accepting and embracing Torah, year after year, is our way of responding powerfully to that uncomfortable feeling of the ground not being steady beneath our feet. When we feel vulnerable, as individuals and as a people, that's when we need to work even harder to rededicate ourselves to Jewish ritual and community. Working to strengthen our own Jewish engagement is what keeps us strong.

### KNOWLEDGE IS OUR SUPERPOWER

With what do we need to equip our children, so they are prepared to enter the world of higher education? Obviously, we have done a superlative job preparing them academically as we can see by the wonderful universities that they have been accepted to. However, now is the time to make sure that they are equipped with the knowledge of who they are, where they come from, and the origins of our people, both biblically and of more recent history. In light of recent current events, our children are finding themselves faced with the new forms of antisemitism and anti-Israel rhetoric the likes of which this country has not seen for a very long time.

Every student deserves to feel safe and supported in the higher educational setting as they go off to college. Nowadays, our students must confront the uneasy reality of antisemitic and anti-Israel rhetoric on the college campus. Too often they find themselves at a loss for words and facts when trying to counter the arguments.

In May 2023, the White House released the first ever national strategy to counter anti-Semitism. This is the first time in American history that the US government has placed important emphasis on this problem. Since 2023, the US Department of Education also launched an anti-Semitism awareness campaign among educator's, students, parents, and communities. This has become a focus for providing tools to members of the community due to the alarming rise of anti-Semitism. The awareness campaign is geared to celebrate the richness of American Jewish identities and traditions. This allows students of all backgrounds to challenge stereotypes and to foster cultural understanding and respect. This community initiative trickles down to elementary schools and middle schools as well as to high schools in our communities. This helps to remind each and every person in our community that inclusion, diversity and acceptance needs to be taught and embraced in the early years of a student's development if we want to build a welcoming community for all.

Students need to learn, in the early years, that no student should face any form of discrimination or harassment because of their race, color, national origins, or ethnic characteristics. These types of inclusion and diversity will help students as they emerge into the world as college students.

How do we prepare students entering the college campus environment to deal with the rise of antisemitism that is so prevalent these days? This is a very important job and must be approached proactively. The most important aspect is the education and knowledge needed to be able to combat this form of hatred. But to acquire this knowledge, one must commit themselves to attend the seminars, workshops and discussions on antisemitism and its manifestations and how to recognize it. **Knowledge is the most important tool, and knowledge must be cultivated.** 

We are now starting to prepare our teens through teen advocacy groups in the Makom High School program in collaboration with American Jewish Council (AJC) and Stand With Us along with our clergy and educators.

Secondly, is to teach our students to recognize the importance of choosing a university that will have a supportive Jewish network on campus along with Jewish organizations that are there for them on campus, such as a Jewish Student Union, Hillel, Mishelanu (for Students with an Israeli background or Israeli parents) and Chabad where they can go for support both socially as well as culturally and religiously.

To summarize, it is important to begin an advocacy program while still in high school to assure that one will have the requisite knowledge and tools to be able to advocate not only individually but also collectively. Our students need to know what they are up against and how to confront it. Participating in an advocacy group empowers them to know where to seek and to find the information that they will need to formulate their arguments. Understanding what the right side of history is, is crucial to being able to be an advocate.

The main message for all of us to be aware of is **equip yourself** with knowledge – knowledge is your superpower.

TBS Sisterhood's wonderful Education Programs and Sisterhood



### INSPIRING, STAR-STUDDED LIVE CONCERT SET FOR MONDAY, JUNE 3RD, AT 7:30 PM The National Yiddish Theatre Folksbiene Will Perform in English & Yiddish with Supertitles

The Yiddish Theater is coming to TBS for an electrifying, theatrical concert on Monday, June 3rd, at 7:30 PM. This live show, called *Soul to Soul*, is a hit that has toured the country and made international appearances. Conceived by the National Yiddish Theatre Folksbiene's (NYTF) Artistic Director Zalmen Mlotek, this high-energy concert features stirring songs in Yiddish (with supertitles) and in English while celebrating the historic partnership between African Americans and Jews during the Civil Rights Era. The moving musical selections are accompanied by an interwoven narrative, complete with multimedia imagery and video. The very talented cast includes Lisa Fishman, Cantor Magda Fishman of Boca Raton, Tony Perry, and Broadway veteran Elmore James. The show is especially relevant now, according to its creators, as it reflects the need for unity and healing in today's world.

The award-winning NYTF, now in its 109th season, is the world's oldest continuously operating Yiddish theatre company and the longest consecutively producing theatre in the United States. The company, which is based at NYC's Museum of Jewish Heritage, presents plays, musicals, concerts, lectures, and workshops. One of its recent productions, composer Barry Manilow and lyricist Bruce Sussman's *Harmony*, a musical in English about a German male singing group forced to disband during the Holocaust, moved to Broadway last fall, where it ran for several months.

NYTF's Soul to Soul one-night-only performance at TBS will benefit our ongoing inclusion efforts, which have enabled the religious school to accommodate special-needs children as well as those on the autism spectrum. In fact, TBS has mainstreamed these students into its regular classes to mirror the trend in public schools and in response to parents' requests, said Sharon Solomon, our educational director. To make their transition successful, we

give the children added support, such as one-to-one tutoring from special-education teachers.

And that is not all. It takes a village to ensure that all students make progress: from the temple's Inclusion Committee members, who have raised funds and awareness, to the teens who aid classroom teachers and the high school seniors who *shadow* students.

Our program is based on academics, Sharon explained, but there's also a social element. Classmates see kids with special needs or requirements as part of the community and they're very accepting and speak up on their behalf. There's also a staffed resource room for students who need to take a break from their classroom.

Another aspect of being an inclusive and welcoming congregation involves making the temple accessible to people with special physical needs, as it did by installing a ramp at the building's Roslyn Road entrance, said Pearl Halegua, an Inclusion Committee chair. Other measures have included making restrooms fully accessible and purchasing prayer books with large type for the visually impaired.

Making the temple and religious school inclusive is an ongoing effort, which Pearl said requires designated funds each year. Rabbi Alan Lucas was a champion of the Inclusion Initiative and Rabbi Joshua Ben-Gideon is also highly supportive, she said, adding that Cantor Barnoy has organized and participated in several concerts over the years to benefit the Inclusion Initiative.



In February, Aljazeera reported on the rise in Anti-Semitism that was reported in the latest AJC survey.

This year's study shows us very clearly that anti-Semitism that was really just a simmering flame is now, especially since October 7, a five-alarm fire, Ted Deutch, CEO of AJC, told The Associated Press news agency.

The survey released on Tuesday found one-quarter of American Jews said they have been the target of anti-Semitism in the past year. Almost half of American Jews responding to the survey said they had altered their behavior during the past year to avoid anti-Semitism – changing what they wore, what they posted online or where they went, so other people would not know they were Jewish.

I live in a rural area and my home is most likely the only Jewish home in a 30-mile radius, a 62-year-old woman was quoted as saying in the survey report. We don't tell people and outside the home do not show that we are Jewish.

The rise in Anti-Semitism and Anit-Zionism since October 7th is staggering. Hate speech on college campuses and throughout the country have become part of the norm. While we have always been aware of Anti-Semitism throughout the world, the Jewish population of the United States has always believed that our existence was secure. Since George Washington's letter to the Hebrew Congregation of Rhode Island in 1790 where he stated it is now no more that toleration is spoken of as if it were the indulgence of one class of people that another enjoyed the exercise of their inherent natural rights, for, happily, the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, until October 7, 2024 we felt secure.

On January 29th we were privileged to welcome Arnie Herz, Past President of the AJC Long Island Board, who helped us to begin to develop our own Intellectual Iron Dome.

On March 11th Mr. Herz was joined by Roman Lipetz, Assistant District Attorney in Brooklyn, NY, who shared insights with us about discrimination law and hate crimes which included some practical information and resources to help you build your personal Intellectual Iron Dome.
