THE JOY THAT CARRIES US FORWARD

Looking Ahead to Shavuot and Beyond

s we prepare to gather once again for the celebration of Shavuot, I find myself struck by a unique emotion that comes with this final festival of the Jewish calendar year: a kind of joyful nostalgia mingled with hopeful anticipation. Shavuot is, in many ways, the crescendo of our liturgical journey—a holiday that doesn't just mark a moment in sacred time, but also brings our yearly cycle of festivals to a close.

We began this cycle long ago with the *shofar* blasts of Rosh Hashanah, the introspective prayers of Yom Kippur and the fragile beauty of the *sukkah*. We kindled the lights of Hanukkah in the deep of winter, recounted our liberation just weeks ago around our *seder* tables, and now we arrive at Shavuot—standing once again at Sinai, receiving *Torah* anew.

There is a certain bittersweetness in arriving at the *last* of something. But in our tradition, endings are never just endings. They are moments of harvest, of gathering up what the year has given us and carrying it forward. On Shavuot, we recall the giving of *Torah*, yes—but we also bring our *bikkurim*, our first fruits. We bring the best of what we've cultivated. And in doing so, we pause to appreciate not just the gift of *Torah*, but also the gifts of each moment we've shared along the way.

I know many of us carry fond memories of this past year's holidays: *Tashlich* by the Duck Pond, the warmth of shared meals

on Sukkot, the laughter of children spinning *dreidels*, the voices joined together around the Passover table. These moments—fleeting as they may be—become part of the rhythm of our lives. And it is their sweetness that stirs in us a longing for the year to come.

Shavuot invites us to both reflect and to recommit. As we remember standing at Sinai, we remind ourselves that we are still standing—still learning, still striving, still bound to one another through *Torah*, community and memory. And as we close the cycle of holidays, we do so with the knowledge that another cycle awaits us, just over the horizon.

So let us celebrate Shavuot with joy—not only for what it represents, but for what it reminds us of: the beauty of a year lived in sacred time, and the anticipation of another year rich with meaning. May our memories of joy and togetherness carry us forward, and may we arrive at the next Rosh Hashanah with full hearts, ready to begin again.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

SHAVUOT AND HARVESTING HOPE

ecently, one of our cats was losing weight and looking weaker with each passing day. After contacting an organization that caught feral cats, I allowed a veterinarian to euthanize Duther (the other) yesterday as she shared that this

was the most compassionate option. I say our because my husband Stuart was the one who first found them, brought them back to life by feeding them, talked to them, scratched and nurtured them until they were frisky, comical, healthy cats, as devoted to us as two outdoor felines could be. This has been devastating and feels like I have lost a part of my husband again.

In conversations with my family, I have tried to find meaning in the multiple traumatic experiences, including a recent car accident, that have taken place in the last 13 months since Stuart's passing. The occurrence of frequent melancholy is not surprising considering how long and happily we were married. I work on reminding myself that I have so much for which to be grateful – a loving and attentive family, good health, dear

friendships and meaningful work. Yet even when reflecting on that which brings joy, I sometimes return to that sense of loss.

Consequently, I find myself looking for answers in religion, faith and *Torah*, particularly as we approach Shavuot. Shavuot is defined as a time of joy and celebration, as it commemorates the giving of the *Torah* on Mount Sinai. It is also associated with a period of sadness, a sense of apprehension, uncertainty and semi-mourning that extends from Passover until three days before Shavuot. The primary reason for this period of sadness is a Talmudic tradition regarding the death of 12,000 students of Rabbi Akiva.

Many of us are feeling some sadness these days, and for good reason. There are losses that can feel enormous – tenuous financial stability, political dissatisfaction, job insecurity, aging parents, Israel and the ongoing hostage crisis. All around us, there are small and big reasons to grieve. There is also another kind of sadness simmering in the air, what psychologist David Kessler identified as anticipatory grief. Anticipatory grief, explains Kessler, is that feeling we get about what the future holds when we're uncertain... There's something bad out there. The myth of certainty has been shattered in our everyday. When our sense of safety is falling apart, isn't it tone-deaf to pretend that the world is

whole and at peace—and so are we? And so, I turn to my various communities and *Torah*, not as an attempt to deny or bypass sadness; but instead as an opportunity to take a break from grieving, however brief, so that I can fortify my heart, rebuild

a sense of safety and help others do the same. We know that helping others heal strengthens us to feel sadness but not yield to it, to feel uncertain without losing hope. We can help others and ourselves feel a little less afraid.

How fitting that along with Shavuot, Mental Health Awareness Month is in May. When someone shares their burden with us, we want to be the primary person to help them. But as much as we care, we might not be able to fully help. We have to learn to seek help and build a support system of those we trust to help us help others. In *Parshat Behaalotecha*, Moshe is challenged by the complaints and demands of the Israelites. He cries out to G-d for help. G-d's response

is to gather seventy elders to *share the burden with you, and you shall not bear it alone.* The *Torah* portion is commonly related to Moshe's leadership and dealing with the complaints as the Israelites adjust to freedom. I believe it also represents another idea: the need for community-wide support.

Loving-kindness (chesed), a major theme of the Torah, plays a central role in the Book of Ruth. I hope the Jewish community, the leaders of our congregations and organizations have the courage and wisdom to listen and do what is necessary to support our community's needs. I know how many congregants sit at my desk at TBS sharing their stories and pray that we will offer helpful Services and perform chesed for families struggling with any illness or hardship. More than ever, we need to find ways to connect with our community. No one should feel alone or without the information, assistance and help they need.

Though this article is completed, the concerns and wistfulness will go on. But as I look outside my patio door, the trees are blooming, the grass is growing thick and green, the squirrels and birds are returning and what will soon be vivid bulbs are poking up out of the ground. There is beauty and hope all around me.

These past few months the students have been engaged in a variety of studies, including learning about Israel, *Torah*, holidays, prayers, history and Hebrew. Our youngest students



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL REFLECTIONS WITH OUR SHINSHINIT

emple Beth Sholom was so lucky to have Aya Kedar as our amazing Shinshin this year. Aya engaged with the Religious School students each week through lessons, projects, conversations and more. Having her share her experiences on life in Israel enhanced the Religious School experience for our students.

Below is an interview with questions TBS Religious School students had for Aya:

TBS: What was the biggest surprise about living in America?

Aya: For me, moving here to be a *shinshinit* wasn't my first time in America – since I spent a couple of years in Maryland when I was in elementary school. I can definitely say the biggest surprise this time was the incredible bond the Jewish community has. Everyone is so tight and loving, and it's not something I noticed when I was a kid. Also, the food portions are huge!

TBS: What do you miss most about Israel?

Aya: The first thing I miss most is my family. I have an older brother (21) and a younger brother (14) and we are all very close. I miss them a lot as well as my parents and our beautiful dog! The other thing I miss most is definitely the *moshav*! I live on a *moshav* (agricultural settlement) and got to enjoy growing up in a tight and very special community. I miss recognizing every person on the street, miss the community celebrations for holidays and other things, and of course I miss my house.

TBS: What inspired you to join the Shinshinim program?

Aya: I always knew I would want to be a *Shinshin* – I just didn't know where. In Israel, there are about a million different prearmy volunteer programs (*Shinshin* years) you can do. The Jewish agency is the only one that send kids abroad. In about 8th grade I heard about it and thought it would be really cool to fly abroad for a year, and talk about Israel. From there I went through a very long selective process and am so happy and lucky to be here!

TBS: What will you miss the most about America?

Aya: The thing I will miss most when I leave is definitely my work! I have the privilege to work in 7 temples, 2 public high schools, a Jewish day school, and 2 Jewish youth movements. I get to

bring Israel to them the way that I view it, I get to bring my Israel. The kids know what I'm passionate about, and I get to pass that passion forward- as well as just have fun and be proud of my country and heritage. I love all the kids I work with and will really miss all of them when I have to leave!

TBS: How are Jewish holidays celebrated differently here than in Israel?

Aya: For me specifically, I celebrate all holidays in the *moshav*. There is usually some sort of community celebration where

we get together and sing, dance, and celebrate. The best holiday in the *moshav* is Shavuot. All the farmers bring their first vegetables or fruits of the season, all the girls wear white dresses and the boys white shirts. We bring all the babies born in the past year on stage for everyone to see. It's a really magical and super fun celebration.

TBS: What has been the most rewarding part of the *Shinshinim* program?

Aya: The most rewarding part was definitely coming back from my break in Israel. In the middle of the year, all the *shinshins* get two weeks off to go home. It was incredibly rewarding coming back and seeing all the kids be so excited to greet me and have me back. It gave me some perspective about the work I'm doing and made me realize what a big impact I have on them.

TBS: What one piece of advice would you give to a future *Shinshin*?

Aya: To be yourself! Bring Israel the way you view Israel, and whatever you love about our beautiful country and culture! The connection is a lot more authentic when it comes from the heart.

TBS: Anything else you would like to share about Israel or your time at Temple Beth Sholom?

Aya: I love working at Temple Beth Sholom and am so appreciative of all of you!

Our lives were truly enriched by Aya and we wish her all the best as she returns to Israel. She is forever a part of the Temple Beth Sholom Family! *L'hitraot*!

TIKKUN LEIL SHAVUOT

and in Hand is an educational organization in Israel that currently has created 6 schools educating approximately 2000 students, 1000 Jewish Israelis and 1000 Arab Israelis - their mission is to Build partnership and equality between Jewish and Arab Citizens of Israel through a growing network of Jewish-Arab schools and communities throughout the country. They have been in existence since 1998. Students are taught both in Hebrew and Arabic and in the later grades they add English as well. The program focuses on humanizing each other and developing an atmosphere of working together in friendship. These schools eliminate the brainwashing and demonizing of the Jews that we have all heard is taught in many of the Arab Schools and they teach equality and understanding about the Israeli Arabs as well.

Lee Gordon is the Co-Founder and Director of American Friends of Hand in Hand. Originally from the United States, Lee lived in Israel for two decades, actively involved in Jewish-Arab dialogue. He earned an M.A. in social work from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and graduated from the Mandel Institute's prestigious School for Educational Leadership.

In the tradition of studying *Torah*, *Talmud* and other relevant Jewish topics on *Erev* Shavuot – we are honored to have him join us for a *Tikkun Leil* Shavuot session on the evening of June 1st. What better way to prepare to accept the *Torah* on Shavuot then to learn about how we can move forward to understand, respect and live in peace with each other.

We would also like to remind you to engage directly in the Zionist arena and make a real, positive impact on Israel and the global diaspora. Voting for representation in The World Zionist Congress elections is open until May 6th, and you have the opportunity to make your voice heard and to advocate for democracy, pluralism and unity.

MERCAZ USA is the American slate of the Conservative/Masorti movement for the World Zionist Congress. MERCAZ USA advocates for the values of the Conservative/Masorti community, as embodied by Conservative organizations like the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, the Rabbinical Assembly and National Ramah Commission.

The World Zionist Congress and its affiliates provide millions of dollars in funding and support the programs that enrich our community and Jewish life in the U.S.

Any Jewish adult over 18 who lives permanently in the U.S. and didn't vote in the last Knesset election can vote for MERCAZ USA in the World Zionist Congress elections.

To vote simply go to votemercazusa.org fill in your basic information and confirm your eligibility, and click yes to affirm the Jerusalem Platform: a basic, consensus definition of Zionist acceptable to everyone - right and left, religious and secular - that has been in place since 1949. Two, pay the \$5 administrative fee - which covers the cost of administering the online election and prevents voter fraud since each credit card can only vote a certain number of times. Three, go and vote for MERCAZ USA. You do not need to be a member of MERCAZ USA to vote. ANY eligible voter can go and vote in the process that takes under 10 minutes.

SISTERHOOD SPICES UP THE SEDER TABLE—MEXICAN STYLE!

n March 27th, the TBS kitchen was buzzing with excitement in the morning as Sisterhood sous chefs prepared to host a special evening featuring The Jewish Food Society. Participants had the opportunity to learn about—and taste—Mexican-inspired Passover dishes, while also gaining insight into the mission behind this remarkable culinary organization.

The evening portion of the event began with a thoughtful conversation between beloved TBS member and author Michele Lang Palter and Jewish Food Society founder Naama Shefi. Shefi shared the story of her journey—from her *kibbutz* roots and time as a food critic to founding the Society, which preserves and celebrates

Jewish recipes from communities around the world, including those in Morocco, Iraq, Ukraine, Iran, Italy and Mexico.

Shefi also spoke about her work with the Asif Culinary Institute of Israel, which she launched in 2021. Since October 7th, Asif has provided more than 15,000 meals to displaced families, while also offering parents the ability to cook comforting meals for their children. Asif has even begun offering therapeutic cooking sessions for soldiers returning from the front lines, underscoring Shefi's belief in the healing power of food.

The second half of the evening featured a cooking demonstration using recipes from *The Jewish Holiday Table*. Thanks to Sisterhood's generous donation of a new audio-visual system, everyone

had a clear view of the action as we learned to make Gefilte Fish in Spicy Tomato Sauce and Mexican Chocolate-Covered Caramelized Matzah. The recipes by Fany Gerson, well known for her expertise in Mexican sweets, is the founder of Newyorkina in Brooklyn and has been featured in The New York Times, Food & Wine and other major publications.

Following the demonstration, guests enjoyed a tasting of the dishes, with plenty of smiles and conversation filling the room. Attendees also had the opportunity to have their cookbooks signed, sample horseradish-infused vodka (inspired by Ukrainian chef Sasha Shor) and shop with Tabletime of Great Neck, featuring beautiful table linens and accessories.

It was an evening filled with flavor, tradition, laughter and

My Father's Memory with Gratitude to the Minyanaires

leven months ago, I lost my dear father. As part of our tradition, I committed myself to saying *kaddish* for him each day—a practice of memory, of faith and of love. Almost every morning at 6:45 AM, my husband and I arrived at Temple Beth Shalom to join the *minyan* in the daily chapel. And many evenings, when I couldn't go, he went without me—ensuring that the prayer could be said.

There were days it was hard to gather ten. There were days it was even harder to get out of bed. But the community — the group of people who came day after day, quietly offering their presence and their prayers—became something sacred. Over time, we grew close. We became more than fellow *Minyanaires*—we became a family of sorts, united not just by grief, but by care and connection.

Sometimes, on Thursday mornings, I would see one of my students—a child preparing to become Bar/Bat Mitzvah—come to put on tefillin. It was so joyful to witness that moment, to share in something beautiful and full of life. I've watched these children grow, and now I see the pride and joy in their parents' eyes as their sons step into Jewish adulthood. In those moments, sorrow and celebration stood side by side—and it reminded me that this minyan is not only a space for mourning, but for meaning, growth and community.

The chapel itself became a place of reflection for me. There is a window above the *aron kodesh* that became my silent companion

over the months. Through that window, I watched the seasons change—leaves turning gold and falling, bare branches covered in snow, and now, finally, blossoms blooming again. I watched birds resting on high branches, and I learned to pray with the rising sun. In that stillness, surrounded by prayer and nature, I felt a deep connection—to my father, to God and to life moving forward. Saying *kaddish* has been a journey of the soul—one of memory, mourning, community and quiet beauty. I am so grateful to everyone who helped make this journey possible. Some who joined us weren't even members of our temple, yet they found a place of comfort here—a sacred space to honor their loved ones and say *kaddish*.

I want to thank Rabbi Ben-Gideon, Cantor Barnoy, David Wasserman and all *minyanaires* who made it possible. Their support and presence made even the hardest mornings feel a little lighter.

My hope is that we continue to gather—not only in times of sorrow, but in times of joy. That we continue to show up for one another, to keep this beautiful tradition strong, and to share in both our tears and our celebrations. May this *minyan* always be a place of connection, compassion and community—a place where we come together in faith and in friendship.
