### FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

### **HOW LONG HAVE I BEEN HERE IN ROSLYN?**

This is my very first bulletin column, the first opportunity for me to introduce myself to some of our members, even though I actually started on September 1st. But let me share a different metric that occurred to me today.

A congregant's father died at age 104, and today was his funeral. The cantor, who knew the family, was going to conduct the graveside service but asked me this morning if I intended to go to the funeral. Having often participated in funerals for older

people, I thought it might be nice and/ or helpful if I showed up, because often people who last so long outlive their best friends and loved ones; it would be an act of *chesed* to give honor to someone, even if I didn't know him or the people in his family.

What I didn't anticipate, though, was arriving at the correct cemetery and suddenly not being sure if the gaggle of cars and people clogging the road were, in fact, from the funeral of our congregant's father! I felt like some people must feel when they walk into our synagogue on a *Shabbat* morning – bewildered and very much out of place. Being so new to the community, I didn't recognize even one solitary soul from *our people*, but I started my car

and joined the long line of other mourners with the hope that it was the correct funeral procession. If not, I told myself, at least someone Jewish would have an extra rabbi to pay respects on their final earthly journey!

I arrived near the grave in time to hear the *pre-recorded taps* played on a fake trumpet used to send off military veterans (being a trumpet player myself, I get a little bit offended by the inauthenticity of it). I then saw Cantor Barnoy across the crowd, so I heaved a sigh of relief, certain that I had arrived at the correct burial. As the Service went on and various family members and the cantor spoke about the deceased, I felt more and more that I was coming to *know* him and his people. They talked about what he had meant to them, how he had pinched their cheeks and played baseball with them, used salty language and taught them enduring life lessons, and on and on. Each additional story helped me feel that I was no longer a total stranger, but that I,

too, had lost somebody who had made the world enjoyable and made life full. By the end of the service, they were no longer strangers to me, nor I to them, but instead I'd become someone who could legitimately share their grief and their shoveling.

Listening to their vignettes, I sensed we had begun to intertwine, in the same way as the two separate candles of Friday night become one braided havdala candle by the end of Shabbat. There is a magic we experience by standing together, sharing together,

mourning together; a magic that knits strangers to become community and community to become friends.

Over the course of the funeral, I looked around, no longer seeing the punishingly bright and hot sun of previous trips to this cemetery. This time, the sky in every direction was robed in grey clouds, almost angrily black and white towards the west, but differently billowing towards the south and east. In fact, although the sky was full of grey, in one direction there was a brownish tinge, like an overstuffed corduroy sofa, while another direction had very clearly defined edges and veins that were stark, with a fluorescent blue cast. There were pink notes to the

east. Everywhere, the *grey* sky proved to be full of colors and shapes and textures, indiscernable at first amidst the cold gusts of October's wind. But – just as surprisingly – as time went by, each different bank of clouds also moved as the wind swept them en masse across the Long Island sky. Although they were different and unique, under the influence of the wind, they skittered across the sky as if painted in one large

This period has given us a moment to reflect on the resilience of the Jewish people and the profound ways in which our congregation came together to help. Our response as a community was immediate, heartfelt and deeply impactful. Be it the missions, the communications to the affected parties or the speakers that have informed us of their experiences, we have been as ONE in our resolve to mark this moment in history and have it feed our future intentions

As we move into the months ahead, from Thanksgiving to Hanukkah we will see the days get shorter and the skies start to dim. We can assure you that the lights at TBS will remain on and burning bright for all. Our Daily, *Shabbat*, *Mishpacha* and Mini *Minyans* continue to thrive. We want to pray with you, not have to pray that people will show up! So... *Nu*....How are you doing on your *Chai Challenge of Minyans*? I have completed my first 18 and am on my way to 36. Let's keep our streaks going as each *minyan* you attend strengthens our community and lifts our spirits.

As much as *minyan* is important to all of us, the *minyanaires* in training, our youth, ALSO need to feel the importance of being part of the community as they grow to the age of *B'nai Mitzvah* and beyond. We have many levels of Youth related activities and groups for all to participate. This will take a commitment of both the parents and the children, TOGETHER, to participate in these social and bonding activities. We need to light their fires early and then let our children feed their needs through these connections. It does not cost anything, but the time and effort from all of us will yield the benefits in the years ahead.

Our work at TBS continues. We will present guest speakers,

offer adult education, as well as a variety of programs designed to challenge us both intellectually and spiritually. We recently introduced *Neshama: Body and Soul*, a program lead by Rabbi Jaymee Alpert, to our teachers, and now it is your turn. We are well along in our rabbinical search process and are currently interviewing candidates. We are seeking a leader who will help us continue to grow and rise even higher, someone who can inspire us to deepen our faith, broaden our learning and continue to light the way. This is an important undertaking and the Rabbinical Search Committee is truly working hard for the community.

As we celebrate Hanukkah, may we all take a moment to pause, reflect and share our inner glow. Let's show our love to those around us and extend that light beyond our own homes and this community. This year, I encourage each of you to light more than one *menorah*. Light one for your family, and another in honor of our brethren in Israel: an IDF soldier who is our modern day Maccabee, a hostage who has returned from the darkness to the light, a survivor of the Nova Festival where their dawn of first light was shattered, or a health care worker who works to heal those night and day. Let these candles we kindle shine brightly enough so that the world can ask, *Where is all that light coming from?* — and we can proudly answer, *From TBS*.

### A RITUAL RECKONING?

At the recent meeting of the Religious Affairs Committee, we discussed many ways that our Services at TBS might be tweaked to help what we do more closely align with what we want to accomplish. We have a proud history of practices here, practices that have been added to over the years to respond to situations that deeply affected us such as the attacks on September 11, 2001, the attacks on October 7, 2023 and more. As time goes by, the immediate shock wears off, but Newton's first law of motion proves to hold true, in what might be termed *ritual inertia:* what is in motion tends to continue unabated until it is acted upon by a force.

We want our Services to be meaningful. We want them to be beautiful, a time set aside for some bursts of joy each week. They should not be bloated or endless; *kiddush* is essential! The sensibilities of our congregation should be respected, as well: some rules have been printed on laminated cards that are distributed throughout the sanctuary, rules regarding respectful attire and the non-usage of cellphones and cameras on *Shabbat*.

All the living hostages from October 7th have been repatriated, but as of this writing, bodies of the murdered remain in the tunnels and hidey-holes of Gaza. Without their return – including

Omer Neutra of Plainview - their relatives and even those of us who didn't know them personally continue our drawn-out agony at the brutality and inhumanity of Hamas and associated terror groups who mock not only them, but every human being who cares about the sanctity of life. Until their return, we will proudly display the yellow ribbon poster, we will continue to sing *Hatikvah* as the capstone of every *Shabbat* Service. When the war is over, we will revisit these policies.

The timing of Services will also be standardized to help us end by noon. The *shacharit Amidah* will regularly be recited with a *heicha kedusha* (the beginning recited out loud, continuing silently) to give every person the chance to speak – in his or her personal way – to the God who listens to each word. We'll read aloud a list of *yahrzeits* before the mourners *kaddish*, with *El Malei Rachamim* reserved only for *Shabbat* afternoon, Monday and Thursday when the *Torah* is present. As the weeks go by, some other minor changes may be implemented, and we'll tell you about them and the reasons we felt them necessary in emails and articles. We hope that the ongoing communications help us, individually and collectively, to deepen our lives as we move forward together.



# FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

### FEELING GOOD ABOUT GIVING

ow wonderful it is to close my eyes and recapture memories from my childhood. One of the sweetest is seeing myself as a little girl standing on a chair next to my mother just prior to lighting Shabbat candles. My mother handed me the coins to be placed in the four cans provided by Jewish agencies that rested on the kitchen window. My parents struggled financially but feeding the cans was a ritual that was never missed and the conversations about the mission of the JNF, Farband (a Labor Zionist organization made up primarily of Holocaust survivors), UJA-Federation of New York and others was part of the practice. This was my introduction to tzedakah and the teaching that even a person who is sustained from tzedakah must also perform tzedakah. I know that on Shabbat when my mother prepared the meal for the four of us, she always provided the same to a neighboring family. I recall my mother sharing that if my father was able to get two apples during the war, he would keep one for his family and give the other away. For as far back as I can remember I knew tzedakah was a core Jewish value.

If you want to teach *tzedakah* and instill philanthropic values in your children make giving a ritual and it will become not just fun but instinctive and proactive as children thrive on repetitive behaviors. To raise generous children let them see you engaged in different acts of kindness, charity, hospitality and sharing. Help your children understand that they are a part of your local and global community where it is incumbent upon all of us to care for the vulnerable, take responsibility for others and help our community thrive. Here are some ways to pass on this practice to your children and grandchildren:

- Make a tzedakah box and decorate it together. Encourage placing money into the box each week.
- If children receive an allowance, it can be divided into three unequal parts, save, spend and *tzedakah*. There are children's banks that are made specifically for this purpose.
- Incorporate giving into holidays by making donations of money or suggesting that the children select one night during Hanukkah when they forego their own gift and donate to a cause that resonates for them.
- Volunteer as a family: Participate at a food bank, visiting the elderly, or a fundraising fun run/walk.
- Have your children select the clothes and toys they have outgrown and donate them to those in need.

 Share your philanthropic efforts with your children and grandchildren and explain how your giving makes a difference and why it's important to you. Nothing is as powerful as modeling behavior.

In terms of *tzedakah* and Temple Beth Sholom, approximately 60% of our congregation family participated in the High Holiday Appeal. You can donate at any time of year but as we approach the end of 2025 it is not just meaningful in terms of the season of giving, but your donation can function as a tax incentive and benefit. More donations means that more good work can take place. Help us strengthen our existing resources. Increased giving at TBS will reflect the dreams and dispositions of us all.

With best wishes for the winter holidays to provide you with warmth, love and light and guide you to a positive beginning to the New Year 2026.

s our air grows cooler (finally!) and the scent of pumpkin spice seems to follow us everywhere, our classrooms are bursting with creativity, kindness and excitement. This season at the ECC is a busy and beautiful one. We are celebrating Thanksgiving, Hanukkah, our very special Mitzvah Week, all leading up to one of our favorite annual events - the Scholastic Book Fair!

Each of these celebrations brings its own lessons, laughter and opportunities for connection. Together, they remind us - and our children - of what it means to be part of a caring community where gratitude, giving and light are at the heart of everything we do.

In the weeks leading up to Thanksgiving, our classrooms transform into spaces filled with conversation, reflection and a little bit of construction paper magic. Children are exploring what it means to feel thankful, and the results are both heartwarming and hilarious. When asked what they are grateful for, answers range from my mommy to Target and the snack closet. These moments remind us that gratitude, at its core, is simple - it's about noticing what makes us happy, what makes us feel loved, and what makes our world a little brighter.

Classrooms are creating gratitude walls, where children contribute drawings and notes about what they love most, and our hallways are lined with smiling turkeys, leaves of thanks and plenty of glitter. It's a celebration that fills not just our rooms, but our hearts.

As part of our Thanksgiving season, we will hold Mitzvah Week, when our ECC families and children come together to donate non-perishable food items for those in need. This is one of our most meaningful traditions and one that beautifully brings our Jewish values to life. Children will help collect, sort and count donations, learning that their efforts can make a real difference. And let's be honest, watching 3-year-olds joyfully stack cans of soup while earnestly explaining that this one is for sharing might be the sweetest sight of the season.

As soon as we packed up our paper turkeys, our classrooms begin to sparkle with the magic of Hanukkah. Our children will learn about the Maccabees and the miracle of the oil in ways that bring the story to life - through storytelling, song and creative play. There's something so special about hearing our little ones belt out I have a little dreidel at full preschool volume (and occasionally invent their own verses). We will light classroom menorahs, spin dreidels and celebrate the themes of bravery, hope and perseverance.

Our art tables will be filled with sparkling menorahs, dreidel collages and just enough glitter to ensure it will never, ever leave our floors. We will taste latkes and talk about how oil plays a special role in the story - and of course, how sharing those treats brings light to others,

As December arrives, we are thrilled to host our annual Scholastic Book Fair, one of our most beloved ECC traditions. It's that magical time when the hallways fill with the smell of new books and the excitement of little readers discovering stories for the first time.

The book fair isn't just about buying books (though we'll admit, it's hard to resist). It's about building a love of reading, imagination and curiosity. Watching a preschooler clutch a book and declare, this one's about a dinosaur who brushes his teeth! is pure joy.

Families can browse together, choose books for home or gifts and even contribute to classroom libraries. It's also a wonderful way to support our school community. Every purchase helps bring more stories, literacy activities and learning resources to our children. So, if you've been looking for an excuse to buy just one more picture book, this is it - and we promise, no one will judge.

These celebrations may come from different traditions, but they share a common message: appreciate what you have, share what you can and bring light wherever you go. Through stories, songs and community giving, our children are learning lessons that will stay with them long after the glitter settles (and maybe even after the last latke is eaten).

From all of us at the ECC, thank you for sharing your wonderful children with us and for being part of this warm, giving community. May your homes be filled with laughter, light and love - and may your menorahs shine as brightly as your little ones' smiles.

It is a time for each of us to pause and reflect on what we are thankful for, including our families, friends, community and the good food that brings us together.

While we have these special times to express our appreciation, Judaism reminds us that saying *thank you* is something we do all year long. The *Modeh Ani* (for boys) or *Modah Ani* (for girls) prayer is the very first thing a person is encouraged to say upon waking. This short but powerful prayer allows us to give thanks for the gift of a new day and for our renewal after a night of rest. Reciting *Modeh Ani* with your child is a wonderful way to cultivate a sense of gratitude and excitement for the day ahead. Even young children who are not yet able to say the words in Hebrew can take a moment upon waking to share something they are looking forward to do that day.

Throughout the day, we have many opportunities to show appreciation through blessings. When we say *Hamotzi* over bread or *Birkat Hamazon* after a meal, we acknowledge the source of our food and express gratitude for the nourishment it provides. These blessings remind us that everything we enjoy ultimately comes from something greater than ourselves.

Beyond blessings for food, Judaism offers us prayers of gratitude for nearly every experience in life. There are blessings for seeing

a rainbow, hearing thunder, smelling a fragrant flower and even for seeing a friend after a long time apart. Each one reminds us to pause, notice and appreciate the world around us. Instead of taking things for granted, we are invited to practice *hakarat hatov*. This Jewish value, which means recognizing the good, teaches us to notice the small, beautiful gifts in our lives, even those we might otherwise overlook.

Practicing hakarat hatov can truly change how we see our days. Instead of rushing from one activity to another, we can take a breath and say, Wow, I'm lucky to have this. Gratitude doesn't have to wait for special holidays like Thanksgiving. Rather, it can happen anytime we open our eyes to the goodness around us and take a moment to give thanks.

Along with offering blessings of gratitude to G-d, Judaism also encourages us to express appreciation to the people in our lives. Saying *thank you*, writing notes of appreciation or offering kind words are powerful ways to model gratitude for our children. These simple acts strengthen our relationships and build a culture of kindness and respect.

From the morning *Modeh Ani* to the rumble of thunder, every moment offers an opportunity to practice *hakarat hatov* and say, *Thank You, G-d, for the good in my life.* When we teach and model gratitude year-round, our children learn to see the world through the lens of thankfulness. They begin to recognize the everyday miracles that surround them and are inspired to share kindness and joy with others.

# ILLUMINATING OUR COMMUNITY: MAKOM TEENS LEAD WITH HEART, PURPOSE AND JEWISH PRIDE

There's something special that happens when our teens come together at Makom. You can feel the energy, the laughter and the sense of belonging that fills the space. It's more than just programming, it's about teens bringing Jewish values to life through leadership, connection and meaningful action.

This past fall has been one of our most powerful seasons yet. In the days leading up to October 7, our teens helped build our



brand-new glow-in-the-dark *sukkah*, generously gifted by TBS donors, right after spending the morning assisting in Religious School. Teens filled the *sukkah* with fluorescent-colored decorations and homemade paper chains carrying messages of resilience and love for Israel, the Hostages and the Jewish people. Their teamwork, creativity and dedication were truly inspiring. On the night of October 7, exactly two years after the horrific attacks in Israel, we gathered inside that very *sukkah*, now glowing with light, color and community. True to the spirit of Jewish gatherings, conversation flowed over delicious Chinese food. Together, we shared

reflection, prayer and hope, transforming the *sukkah* into a space of connection, joy and memory.

That same light continues to guide everything we do in Makom. Through Activ8!, our teen social action program, TBS teens are turning compassion into action. Their school supplies drive helped local students start the year feeling confident and cared for, and they organized a Winter Coat Drive to help families stay warm through the colder months. These projects aren't just

about collecting items, they're about living our Jewish values of *chesed* (kindness) and *tikkun olam* (repairing the world) in meaningful, tangible ways. We're also thrilled for our upcoming *challah*-baking events, where teens will braid and bake *challah* to share the sweetness with our community, spreading joy and connection one loaf at a time!

Each week, our *Madrichim*, teen assistants in the Religious School, show up ready to make a difference. They help younger students feel seen, supported and excited about learning. From setting up projects to answering questions or lending a helping hand to our teachers, our *Madrichim* model what it means to be proud, compassionate and engaged Jewish teens. The Religious School students truly look up to them.

Looking ahead, we're especially excited for our Makom Hanukkah Party, where all of Makom will come together to celebrate the Festival of Lights. We'll gather to play games, do crafts, enjoy

sufganiyot and share in the warmth of community during one of the most joyful times of the year. Hanukkah is a season of hope, resilience and shining our light in the world, and our teens will be at the heart of it—bringing energy, creativity and friendship to every activity. It's a chance for teens to connect with one another, celebrate our traditions and feel the joy of making Judaism come alive in real time.

In a world that can sometimes feel dark, our teens are bringing light in remarkable ways. Their energy, creativity and dedication remind us that connection, unity and joy are the

brightest lights of all. Through Makom, they are discovering that Judaism isn't just a set of beliefs—it's a way to act, to inspire and to make a difference. It's a lived experience; one they will carry into every corner of their lives.

n September 27th our Social Action Committee was delighted to welcome Liz Hirsch Naftali as part of C.L.A.S.S., the Temple Beth Sholom Community Luncheon and Speakers on *Shabbat* program. Liz is a hostage and humanitarian advocate and the author of *Saving Abigail*. She shared her inspiring story as the great aunt of Abigail Mor Edan, a three-year-old who was held hostage in Gaza for fifty-one days. Abigail was kidnapped by Hamas terrorists on October 7, 2023, from her community, Kfar Aza, after her parents were both murdered in front of her by Hamas terrorists.

On October 4th we were delighted to welcome Jason Schachter McKinney – author of *Jason Belongs*: Jason shared his experience of being a Jew of Color, the challenges he faced and how he finally was able to embrace his heritage and become an operatrained musical director at Temple Emmanuel Winston-Salem, NC. His eye opening and thoughtful presentation was made available to members of our ECC, Religious School and our adult community.

Antisemitism often disguised by anti-Israel rhetoric is certainly on the rise. One of our Social Action Committee goals is to not only try to understand what is happening, but to also work to develop strategies and skills to combat it. To that end, we have invited the producer of *Tragic Awakening*, Rabbi Raphael Shore to join us on December 8th at 7:45 PM to share his insights.

In January will we honor Martin Luther King Jr. when Philip Kadish will be joining us to share his insights on *Two Centuries of Selling Racism in America*.

In our last article we discussed the work of Hand in Hand, an educational organization in Israel that currently has created 6 schools educating approximately 2000 students, 1000 Jewish Israelis and 1000 Arab Israeli. Their mission is to Build partnership and equality between Jewish and Arab Citizens of Israel through a growing network of Jewish-Arab schools and communities throughout the country. They have been in existence since 1998. Students are taught both in Hebrew and Arabic and in the later grades they add English as well. The program focuses

on humanizing each other and developing an atmosphere of working together in friendship. These schools eliminate the brainwashing and demonizing of the Jews that we have all heard is taught in many of the Arab schools and they teach equality and understanding about the Israeli Arabs as well.

The work of Hand in Hand is even more important today. *Baruch Hashem* all of the live hostages have been returned to Israel. We pray that the current cease fire in Gaza persists and that it evolves into a permanent peace. The pathway to mutual understanding that Hand in Hand fosters can only help all to create a better future for everyone in Israel. We are delighted to announce that Lee Gordon, Co-Founder and Director of American Friends of Hand in Hand will be joining us on Sunday morning February

On 3/7/26, Jonathan Harounoff: author of **#WomenLifeFreedom** will join us to examine and help us understand the powerful uprising of women in Iran following the 2022 death of Mahsa Amini and the current political situation in Iran.

In April, Mark Patinkin will join us to share his personal observations through his journey in Israel, the West Bank and Gaza.

In June we have scheduled Richard Kreitner to discuss his book Fear No Pharaoh American Jews, the Civil War and the Fight to End Slavery.

The success of our Annual Appeal is critical to our synagogue's year-round operations. Membership dues and tuition only cover a fraction of the costs associated with providing the highest level of services which include keeping our members safe in our building, maintaining and enhancing our extraordinary programming and connecting with those who are part of our warm and caring community. The Annual Appeal is launched each year at Yom Kippur and continues through the end of June.

Members often ask how they can support Temple Beth Sholom while maximizing their tax implications. If you're considering a gift to TBS as the year ends, the following are options many have found beneficial:

### **Initiate Gifts of Stocks or Other Securities**

Giving appreciated stocks, bonds, or mutual fund shares held more than one year can provide an immediate benefit to TBS and may be more efficient than cash. By making a gift using appreciated securities you may receive a double tax benefit by avoiding capital gains taxes on the appreciation of the donated assets, and by claiming an immediate deduction for the current fair market value of the property (up to 30% of adjusted gross income.)

### **Qualified Charitable Distribution**

The IRA Charitable Rollover Law allows individuals 70 ½ or older to give up to \$100,000 (for couples, each spouse may give up to \$100,000) directly from their IRA to qualified charitable organizations without paying federal income tax on the distribution. If you wish to make a gift to benefit Temple Beth Sholom, a qualified charitable distribution from your IRA can be a great option. Donors must ask their plan administrator to make a direct transfer of funds to TBS. It is important not to withdraw funds before making a gift.

### Make Your Gift by Wire Transfer or Send in a Check

The above options are always welcome.

If you haven't yet, please consider making a philanthropic end of year gift to TBS. Every gift, regardless of size makes a tremendous impact in the life of our synagogue. We depend on your generosity.
